From William Austin with corrections/additions to page 167 of his book, (pages 48-50 this issue) Sunday, June 3, 2001 -O O Box 62, Laceyville, PA 18623-0062 Dear Carole,

Claude has told you of his success in identifying the ancestry of the **Isaac Bonnell** who settled in Guernsey Co, .OH, about 1812-14. This is a major accomplishment, especially since Isaac had so many descendants. Isaac had 11 children and I find it remarkable that I have received correspondence from descendants of 10 0f those children seeking to learn where he fits in the family tree. It has taken more than forty years since I first heard of the Isaac, but we are finally in a position to answer the question.

On pg 167 of my book "Bunnell/Bonnell Family in America" Vol 1 of Massachusetts Bay and New Haven Colonies, The First Five Generations - by Heritage Books, Inc 1999¹, I wrote about Isaac Bonnell (Abraham, Isaac, Nathaniel, William) of Hunterdon Co. NJ. I had no information on his wife or children or what happened to him after

about his 40th year. It is now clear that this is the same person as the Isaac who moved to Loudon Co. VA, then to Crawford Co., PA and finally to Guernsey Co., OH.

I have enclosed a three-page outline of his life to replace the article on page 167 of my book. If you have the space in the Newsletter it would be helpful to all who have purchased the book. (*This will be the last three pages of this issue. You may easily remove and put into Wm Austin's book, if you bought one. Carole.*)

Regarding Direct Line: It is necessary to clarify the speculation of **Monty Peden** on page 6 of the February 2001 Newsletter regarding **Benjamin Bonnell**, reputed to be the father of **Aaron Bonnell** of Washington Co. PA. The only evidence we have for the existence of this **Benjamin** and his wife **Eleanor** is the assertion in a Hatfield family Bible that they were the parents of **Aaron**. No other reference to a **Benjamin Bonnell** has been identified with him.

The **Benjamin Bonnell** who was born 23 November 1923 was 1-3-1-2-2 D63 CB300043 on page 141 of my book. This **Benjamin** had an entirely different son **Aaron**, born 4 March 1759, whose life is well attested. See Newsletter Vol. X, No.2, page 18 and 19 (1996 published by Wm Austin) for analysis of the **Benjamin Bonnells** of New Jersey prior to 1800.

The family of Lower Smithfield twp., Northampton Co., PA was that of **Solomon Bunnell** 1-1-6-4 D12 CB290004, on page 65 of my book, and his three sons, **Isaac, Benjamin** and **Solomon.** Son **Benjamin** appears at length on page 96 et seq. with 13 children, not including **Aaron.**

I suppose it is possible that **Nathaniel** and **David Bonnell** who witnessed the **Brotherton** deed were unknown brothers of the **Aaron Bonnell** who married **Ann Brotherton**, but I think it far more likely that **Nathaniel Bonnell** was 1-3-7-7-2 CB300154 on page 173 of my book. **David Bonnell** was probably 1-3-1-4-2 DCB300191 on page 152. (See also the last paragraph of the corrected account of **David Bonnell** CB300147 which you published on Page 17, Newsletter of 1 February 2000. Both of these men were long-time residents of Mendham twp., Morris Co., NJ. Their relationship to **Aaron** has not been determined. (See Direct Lines page for more corrections)

On page 9 of the February 2001 Newsletter you published an extract from the Brantford City, Ontario, (Canada) 1901 Census. For more on this family, see Newsletter III, No 4, pages 7-9 (1989-pub.By Wm Austin).

I'm sorry I took so long to get this material to you, but as I mentioned in the e-mail note, I have trouble finding the time to work on genealogy at this time of year. Keep up the good work.

Retiree's van hits tanker in Texas. Two close-knit farm communities worked to come to grips Sunday with the weekend traffic accident in Texas.

Killed in the crash were the van's driver: **Marvin Simpson,** 73 and his wife **Loree** 80; **Dean Peyton,** 73 and his wife **Norma,** 73 and <u>CJ Bunnell Jr.</u> 74, all of Trenton and **Roy Coon**, 74 and his wife, **Marilyn**, 69, from nearby Spickard.

The condition of **Bunnell's** wife, **Marian**, 72, was upgraded from critical to stable Sunday at Valley Baptist Hospital in Harlingen. The driver of the tanker truck, **Arturo Garcia**, 38, of Harlingen, was released from a hospital Saturday after treatment for minor injuries and shock.

Friends in Missouri said the four couples often traveled to southern Texas. They all went there every winter said Simpson's next door neighbor, **Lynbdall Stonecker.** They had trailers; most of them went down right after Christmas and stayed until about the first of April

On Sunday, Trenton's First Christian Church leaders shared stories of the **Bunnells**, who had been with the church for years.

Trenton, MO - The deaths of a sheriff's parents, a city councilman's father, and a local banker over the weekend has left a community mourning seven lost lives.

"It becomes a community that pulls together, that helps each other out and helps each other through" said **Tim Whitaker**, mayor of Trenton, MO.

Of eight Grundy county residents involved in the automobile accident in Harlingen, Texas only one survived, - Trenton resident **Kathryn Bunnell.**

Her son, city councilman, Larry Bunnell, and his brother traveled to Texas to visit their mother.

Ms Bunnell is in stable condition after enduring trauma from the accident Saturday, said **Mike Swartz**, assistant director of community relations at Valley Baptist Medical Center in Texas. **Ms Bunnell's** husband and six of her friends, who were vacationing in the Lonestar State, died in the accident that involved their van, which was broadsided by a tanker truck. Her husband **CJ**, a local farmer, and six friends died in the accident

Enclosed is my check for \$14.00 for the Bunnell/Bonnell Newsletter for one year. I have **William Austin's** book. **"The Bunnell/Bonnell Family in America" Volume 1.** Unfortunately, I have not proved that far back. I have a lot of information and of course, nothing has been proved.

I am also enclosing the information that I have in a descendants chart, along with a Pedigree Chart for **Anna Bonnell,(Anna's** line is not proved) A couple of years ago I sent a check to the Erie Society for Genealogical Research but did not receive a reply either positive or negative. I do not know what records were looked at and if anything was found on **William Harrison (W.H.)** or not. I have been told that the churches and courthouses no longer exist for that time period and all records were lost in Erie Co. PA.

There are other people looking for **William Harrison Bunnells**' father as well. We all have the same story.
"William Harrison Bonnell was born in Greene, Erie co., PA 1 Jan 1818. He married **Margaret Elizabeth Goble** in Erie co. PA 6 March 1845. **W. H.** father was **William Bonnell** born 1788 in Paxton Creek, PA and he married **Elizabeth Hogan** who was born 1792. **William's** father was **John Bonnell** born Dublin Ireland in 1757 and his mother was **Nancy Farraday** also born in Dublin, Ireland. **John** came to PA in 1775 and fought in the Revolutionary War. **Margaret Bonnell** daughter of **James Monroe Bonnell**; son of **William Harrison Bonnell** did genealogy on the **Bonnell Family**, but she never married and did not have children and no one knows what happened to her research". She died before I started to work on this line. I do not know what proof she had or where she found it.

I am looking for the parents and siblings of William Harrison b.1 Jan 1818 Eric Co., PA. I have a W.S. (?) Bonnell buried in the Pioneer Cemetery, Town of Rosendale, Fond du Lac co., WI. He died 22 June 1878, age 85 years. Elizabeth - w/o Wm died 27 May 1865, age 73 years. This would make his birth around 1793 and hers 1792. I have also found a Willis Bonnell (with wife Elizabeth) in the 1850 census at the age of 60 which would give a birth date of 1790. In the 1860 census he is listed as 70, which would still be a birth date of 1790. They had a son, Wilson S. born about 1836 (brother of W.H.) that is listed on the 1860 census and is buried in the Pioneer Cemetery as s/o Wm & E. There is also a James P Bonnell buried in the same lot (b abt 1825) died 30 Sept 1858 age 33 years, 7 months, and 16 days. (Another son of Wm & Elizabeth?)

According to the "History of Little Pine Valley" by Harry Stephenson, Sr., Wm Bonnell b. 1788 married Elizabeth Haggerty and they had 9 children. No William or Wilson listed. The PA Archives, 5th series, vol 7, p 346, Cheney Collection, Erie Co. Historical Society, Bk #23 has William, (son of John Bonnell) b 1788 married Elizabeth Hogan b 1795, no children listed. From http://members.aol/grovemark/Bonnell.html I found a Wm Bonnell b 1788 who married Elizabeth Haggerty and they had 9 children, not William or Wilson listed.

From the "History of Fond du Lac county 1880" Biographical Sketches. "W.H Bonnell, (deceased) was born in Erie co. Penn, Jan. 1 1818; he came West in 1856 and settled six miles north of Rosendale, Rosendale Township, in this county, having purchased there a farm the year before....(con't) He married Miss Margaret E Goble in Erie co., Penn., March 6, 1845; her parents were Timothy and Mary B Goble of Rochester. NY."

If you know of anyone that can help me, I would appreciate it very much. As I do not know how much space is available in the newsletter, would you please put a query in for me, with the information that you think is relevant in my search for the parents of William Harrison Bonnell? Thank you for any assistance.

MARY ETTA (BONNEL) FREELAND 1860-1952

"She Put the 'Grand' in Grandma" - June 2001 - brief story of Mary Etta (Bonnel) Freeland

My favorite grandma was Grandma Freeland. Not to slight my other grandma, but grandmas are like pennies--sometimes one shines a little brighter than the other. Her maiden name was Mary Etta Bonnel (pronounced to
rhyme with "tunnel"). She married James Henry Freeland in Atchinson, KS on 7 Mar 1880. She was born on 27
Jul 1860 and died on 23 June 1952.

Mary Etta was a stern, serious woman, but behind that sober visage was a loving Christian soul who lived by the Bible and did her best to take care of her fellow men. I never heard her speak a word in anger or raise her voice to anyone. On the other hand, I can't ever remember ever 'seeing' her laugh. Not that she didn't, but she always covered her face with her hand when she did. And her little belly would quiver like the proverbial bowl of jelly.

She was the original soft touch. Her modest home was in Kingman, KS. A number of indigents (OK, bums) passed through town along highway 54 or at the AT&SF Railroad. The word was out that **Grandma Freeland** always had a hot meal for the asking. Many a bum I've seen knock on her door for a meal. And she never turned them down. I don't know how they found her, but they wore a path to her welcome mat.

There was a Catch22, however. They had to work for their meal. She saved up little odd jobs and doled them out before the food. They had to mow the lawn, or clean the chicken coop, or mend the fence, or clean the gutters - always some little job that made them feel they had earned their meal, and also helped keep her home going. After the job was complete to her satisfaction, they were invited into the kitchen and served a good, hot meal. Nothing fancy, mind, but

plenty of solid food. Then when they were full, there was always a little more wrapped in paper to take along for the road ahead.

My family had a problem every time we came to town. I was raised on a small farm four miles from town. When we came to town to visit the grandparents, we had to visit both sides of the house every time. Grandma Freeland, a widow lady, lived just two houses from my other grandparents. When our car parked in front of one, the other would always see it, and we'd be in trouble if we didn't also stop at the other house.

The relationship between the two families was civil, but not close. The only friendly exchange I ever saw was each summer, whoever first picked roasting ears in their garden called across the backyard of the neighbor between to offer the other a mess of corn. It was a feather in the cap to have the first ripe ears of the season.

Although I lived in the country, I went to town for school The bridge across the Ninnescah River had washed out years before and was never replaced. This kept me from attending the rural one-room school in my district. I was therefore allowed to attend town school (K-12) without paying a penalty tuition. Dad would take me in to school in the morning and fetch me that afternoon. In high school, we had a car-pooling arrangement with a neighbor. And I ate lunch at Grandma Freeland's.

Grandma tried to have dishes that pleased my finicky tastes. In retrospect, I wish I had been more appreciative of her efforts. I know she tried her best to please me, and was disappointed many times by my offhand response. One dish I remember she tried to have often because I did show my appreciation. That was oyster casserole. I have no idea where I glommed on to that dish (oysters in Kansas?), but she found out I liked it.

She lived two blocks from the grocery store. She would walk, increasingly painful with the years and arthritis, to the market and buy canned oysters for me. Then with pride she would place a steaming casserole before me when I trooped in from school. Oh, it was so good!

Grandma had several sayings and habits that seem strange today. When she was coming down with a cold, she would heat coal oil (Kerosene) on an old cook stove, swallow a tablespoon as medicine, and rub another tablespoonful of hot oil on her chest and cover it with a soaked poultice. I don't know if it worked, but she thought it did. That was what counted, I guess. You could smell her a block away.

One day she pointed out the wind waves constantly weaving their way across a field of mature wheat. In her day, she was told that the waves were 'old Lawrence' coming to get bad little kids. So you'd better be good! I've never heard that expression anywhere else. Maybe he was reserved for bad little Bonnels.

Mary Etta lived to almost 92, an accomplishment for anyone. She's buried in Walnut Hill Cemetery in Kingman, KS. She didn't rust out, she wore out. She worked hard every day of her life. The oldest of 16 children, she often said she did most of the raisin'. If she can just find out her Lord's favorite dish, I'm sure she's cooking up a storm in Heaven every day.

It is easy to use. There is an index; It shows typed census pages, which give you the enumeration district, sheet, page and house number. (so you can check original census pages for verification) You can also see the neighbors by scanning up or down the page. And as always, the price is very reasonable from the LDS Family History Center in Salt Lake City.

National Burial Index for England and Wales: Over 5 million records indexed from 1538-2000 on 2 CD's. These burial records are from English and Welsh parishes, nonconformist and cemetery registers. 5.4 million records are included, extracted from some 4,440 burial registers. The coverage is best for the period of 1813-1837, but it does include burials from a much wider time period. Monument inscriptions are NOT included. Dist # 1 also includes the installation program to read these CD's. For each individual record, the 'view Record' dialogue shows which society; group of individual submitted that particular record. By accessing 'Reference 1 Geographical Coverage' you can obtain the same information, but for a whole burial ground or cemetery. Duykinck at Amboy, NJ, on 6 July 1776^[6], and the Isaac Bonnell of Kingwood, NJ, listed in the 1778 in the *Revolutionary Census of New Jersey*, by Ken Stryker-Rodda^[4]. He is listed in the *Official Roster of Revolutionary Soldiers Buried in Ohio* ^[10]

He married CATHERINE SEVERNS ^[9], daughter of Samuel and Mary Severns^[13]. She was around twenty years younger than Isaac. He was over 35 when their first child was born and she must still have been in her teens. This could have been a second marriage for Isaac, although, I have found no evidence for a prior one. Isaac Bonnill owned 50 acres of improved land in Kingwood twp, Hunterdon co., in May 1778 and a house and lot in Kingwood in January/February 1780^[2]. He appears in *Hunterdon County Taxpayers 1778-1797* as Isaac Bonhill, Kingwood, in 1786, and Isaac Bonnill, Kingwood in 1789^[5]. He was probably also the Bonbill, Kingwood, in the 1779^[5]. He also owned taxable property in Alexandria twp, Hunterdon co, in July 1785 (the first extant tax list for that twp) and in July 1786^[3]. Other than the fact that sons William and Jesse were said to have been born in New Jersey, this is the last reference to this Isaac Bonnell in New Jersey that I have found.

Isaac and Catherine seem to have lived for a time in Loudon co, VA, since the last three or four of their children were apparently born there. Isaac witnessed a deed there in $1797^{[12]}$. (It is just possible that he was the Isaac Bunnell who witnessed a deed on 16 August 1798, from Henry Owsley and wife Martha of Lincoln co. KY, to William Reed of Mason co., KY, for land in Mason co $^{[8]}$.)

They moved next to Crawford co, PA , where he bought 200 acres in tract 1294 from Francis Holmes and James Herreatte on 1 June $1808^{[14]}$. In 1810 he appears in the census in Wayne twp, Crawford co PA: $10311\text{-}2111^{[15]}$. On 12 October 1812 Isaac Bunnell, miller, (Note that Catherine's father, Samuel Severns, was a mill owner in New Jersey [13]. And wife Catherine sold tract 1294 to Thomas Cochran for \$4000^{[14]}In September 1814 he bought three parcels of land in Madison twp, Guernsey co OH, from members of the Huffman family [16]. Here he laid out the town of Winchester [17]. Sales of lots in Winchester by Isaac and his heirs appear on the Guernsey co records for the next 20 years [16]. Isaac appears in the 1820 census in Madison twp., Guernsey co: $1000111\text{-}01201^{[15]}$. The same year he was appointed on 18 July as Commissioner to pay bills for the road from Winchester to Fairview [16]. He is also listed in the 1825 tax list in Guernsey co [18]. He appears again in the 1830 census in Madison twp, Guernsey co: $000000000001\text{-}000010001^{[15]}$

Isaac died intestate in Guernsey co (15 June?) 1834 and his estate was probated there. Letters of Administration were granted 19 June 1834 to Jonathan Bonnell and John Dillon ^[20]. He was buried in Winterset, Madison twp ^[10]. In April 1836 some of his heirs petitioned the court of **Compiled by William R. Austin**

Common Pleas of Guernsey co to partition and distribute the real estate owned by Isaac Bonnell at the time of his death ^[21]. The real estate consisted of the following pieces:

The northwest quarter of Section 14, Township 3, Range 1, of the unappropriated lands in the military district, containing 160 acres more or less.

The southwest quarter of Section 14, Township 3, Range 1, of the unappropriated lands in the military district, excepting 15 acres included in the town plat of New Winchester, containing 145 acres more or less.

Lots #3, #4, #37 and #38 in the town of New Winchester [21]

These lands were sold at auction in October 1836 for a total of \$3453.25. The widow Catherine received a third as her dower right, and the remainder, after deducting expenses, was divided among the children and/or their assigns^[21] On 12 April 1837 Catherine sold her dower interest in Section 14, Township 3, Range 1, to her son William for \$600 ^[16].

Catherine Bonnell died in 1839 in Madison twp. Her will, dated 5 May 1837, and probated 8 April 1839, is recorded in Guernsey co, but mentions only one child, her son Isaac, Jr. Her will reads as follows:

In the name of the benevolent father of all, I Catherine Bonnell of the County of Guernsey in the state of Ohio do make and publish this my last will and Testament.

<u>First</u>. It is my will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid out of my estate. <u>Second</u>. I give and devise all the residue of my estate to my grandchildren, the sons and daughters of my son Isaac Bonnell to them and their heirs and assigns forever.

<u>Third.</u> I appoint Nathan Evans of the said County of Guernsey, executor of this my last will and testament. I do hereby revoke and annul all former wills by me made. In testimony whereof, I hereunto set my hand and seal this 5th day of May in the year of our Lord Eighteen hundred and thirty-seven.
