Dear Charlie,

Florentine Films, under the direction of Ken Burns, is currently producing a five part documentary film series on the history of the National Parks.

I am looking for an early photograph of Lafayette Bunnell. It could be anytime up to say 1875 or so. We are, of course, talking of him in regards to the trip to Yosemite with the Mariposa Battalion, so the earlier the better. However, at this point I would love to look at anything even if it is later.

So far I have only seen an engraving and an older picture where he is wearing a medal of some sort on his lapel. The last picture is just too late for us to use, and the engraving I don't think would be of a quality that we could use.

The other interesting image I found was on the Online Archive of California. (OAC) I did a search for just Bunnell, and saw a daguerreotype of an unidentified young man as part of the Bunnell-Mapes family papers. I have not had time to do any further research about this, but I was struck that the young man does look like Lafayette, and is also wearing the same sort of medal or something shaped like it on his jacket. Of course, I have no way of determining if this is Lafayette, or whether or not the Mapes connection would determine anything, and, of course, the resemblance may be in my mind. That will take you to a collection of cased photographs. Do a search for Bunnell [in the box under the red text for "View items from this collection"] and you will see the "unidentified young man" shot I am talking about.

Ed. Note: Regarding the website she mentions, I went to it and the Mapes connection is with James Sterling Bunnell., 1843-1906, (CB330156) who married Catherine T. Mapes. That line doesn't tie into Lafayette's until you go back to Benjamin (c.1630 - 1696) so the unidentified Bunnell in the photo she mentions could be James and Catherine (Mapes) Bunnell's son Alexander or a son of one of James' several brothers. But it would not be expected to be Lafayette Bunnell's photo. I advised Mrs Steisel of this.

... re. Marjorie Gibbs items (pg. 47) Hudson-Bunnell marriage Crawford county PA-- (no year given)

In my notes [may be from different newspaper?] I have Mrs. Susan Bunnell(Linesville, PA) married Charles A. Hudson (Jamestown, PA) M. July 24, 1892 in Linesville by A.M.Fenner, Esq. = from the Crawford Journal July 28, 1892--pg.8 col 5.

Also, you note that you were unable to find Susan in Claude's database...in information from Claude, I find Susan Adelia Irons, dau of George and Rachel [Bishop] Irons listed as wid of Aaron W (320975) [he's son of Samuel]

1892-24 July-Wid. Susan mar 2nd Charles Hudson----

1904-17 Sept-Wid. Susan mar 3rd Restore Douglass.

Susan was also connected to the Bunnell line as Susan's mother was a daughter of James and Susannah [Bonnell/Bunnell] Bishop and granddaughter of Abraham Bonnell/Bunnell

I also received this back in 2000, by way of Karl & Sue Dennis from Kathy Brubaker....from the Paul Henry Scrapbook at the Linesville Historical Society. Page 9 col. 4

"Susan A. Irons was born October 14, 1828, and passed away Feb. 4th, 1915, aged 86 years, 3 months and 21 days. Her long life was spent in this section of the country, and principally in this community. In 1848 she was married to Aaron W. Bunnell, by whom she had eight children, four of whom are living, so far as known.-George, of Marieta, Ohio; John, of New Castle, PA; Jeady, of Clark's Corners, O., {my note here-this is my J.O, also known as Judson} and Malvina S. Lisk, who cared for her during the last years of her life. She was married to C.A. Hudson in 1892, and to Restore Douglass in 1904; she had been a member of the Baptist Church for many years, and was always interested in its work, and grieved constantly when infirmity prevented her from attending the services. The funeral was held in the Baptist church, Feb. 9, the pastor officiating"

J.O. [aka Judson] Bunnell, son of Aaron and Susan was my great grandfather. <lol> just check out the old May 2001 Vol 15 #2 Judson O. Bunnell and you'll see my info. and confusion as I was trying to put all my Bunnell line together..

Her husband, the Rev. Walter S. **Bonnell**, died June 2, 1961. He was a retired Lutheran pastor.

Mrs. **Bonnell** was a graduate of Trenton High School, Trenton Normal School and Carroll Robbins Training School in Trenton.

She was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, the Onward and Upward Society and the LCW of the church.

Survivors include another son, Walter S., Phillipsburg, and three grandchildren.

#### George N. Bonnell

BRANCHBURG - George N. **Bonnell** died April 1, 2004 at the Watchung Ridge Assisted Living in Watchung. He was 77.

He was the father of Leesa Csolak of Raritan Township.

Born in Jersey City, he was raised in Rahway and lived in Branchburg for 38 years. He received his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Newark College of Engineering in 1958.

He was a professional engineer for several companies, specializing in Web processing equipment design, for which he held several U.S. patents. He retired in 1988 from Johnson & Johnson in New Brunswick.

Mr. **Bonnell** was an avid aviator and aircraft model builder. He was a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association and built a single seat acrobatic airplane called an RV-3 at his home over a 5-year period. He was a commercial pilot with an instrument rating. He was an Army Air Corps veteran of World War II.

Along with his daughter, he is survived by his wife, Mary **Tabor Bonnell**; 2 sons, Jeffrey of Scotch Plains and Corey of Virginia; and 7 grandchildren.

Sally Fahrenthold, <u>sallyf@cox.net</u>, or 2658 N. Ridgewood Ct., Wichita, KS. 67220, received some church records from the Pike, NY Village Historian, Lunamae Flint and has passed it on for everyone:

Background: Phebe Bonnell [maiden name] (b. 1772), wife of Henry Bunnell (b. 1772), died in Mentz, NY in 1845. There is a record (Claude Bunnell) of Henry George Bunnell (b. 1772) living in Mentz, NY with daughters Temperance and Phebe.

#### Church Records:

- 1. Baptist Church of Pike, NY receives Henry Bunnell and Eliza Bunnell on February 2, 1850, by letter of transfer. This is Henry George Bunnell, b. 1810 and Eliza Jane Loomis Bunnell, b. 1820. This record indicates that Henry died Nov. 22, 1857, and Eliza was dismissed Nov. '58.
- 2. Baptist Church in Rose NY writes letter of transfer for Henry Bunnel and Phebe Ann his daughter, February 29, 1852. Henry Bunnell b. 1772 and Phebe Ann Bunnell b. 1800.
- 3. Baptist Church of Pike NY received Henry Bunnel and Phebe Ann Bunnel on March 5, 1853 by letter of transfer. This is Henry Bunnell born 1772 and Phebe Ann b. 1800. The church record has that Phebe Ann died on February 15, 1854. Henry Bunnell was dismissed in November 1858. [Sally's comments: Henry apparently moved to Oswego, NY, by 1860, to live with Nathaniel and Anna Bunnell, both age 53 and born in NY (1860 census info). Who are they???]
- 4. Another record of Baptist Church of Pike NY has the baptism of Lyman H. Bunnel on April 8, 1858. It does not indicate how or when he left the church. This is Lyman H. Bunnell b. 1843, eldest son of Henry George Bunnell and Eliza Loomis Bunnell.

[Ed. Note: Claude's database shows that Henry and Phebe had a total of 11 children; one son was named Nathaniel and married Ann \_\_\_\_\_\_. It would appear that the Nathaniel and Anna shown in the 1860 census that Henry is living with are his son and daughter-in-law. I find only one Nathaniel Bunnell in NY for the 1860 census. But I'm not sure what Claude is using as a basis for concluding that the Nathaniel in the census is Henry's son.]

# Biographies

#### A follow-up to Daniel Reynolds Bonnell (CB004840)

In the last issue we printed a bio of Daniel Bonnell that was submitted by his great grandson, Geoff Brown (geoff@betweenthelakes.com. William Austin has sent some additional information from his files. I have edited to primarily provide only information that either wasn't included in the previous issue or amplifies the previous article. My comments are in italics, enclosed in brackets [].

"Daniel Reynolds Bonnell was born 30 November 1823 in Liberty, Sullivan Co., NY [The prior article stated he was born in Fallsburgh; they are about 11 miles apart]. (A William Bunnell was a resident of Liberty in the 1830 census with a son the right age to be Daniel.) He is supposed to have come as a young man to Sullivan co, NY, in the vicinity of Forestburg, where he had a saw mill. From there he must have settled near Liberty, Sullivan co, NY, with property in the towns of Liberty and Fallsburgh. Part of his property is now the Grossinger Airport. [His first wife] died in 1868 in Sullivan co, NY, and he hired Sarah Ann Hotchkin, daughter of Francis J. and Lydia (Grant) Hotchkin, to take care of the house and children. She was born 4 February 1840 in New York state. She brought her daughter Minnie Hotchkin, born in 1861, with her. Daniel and Sarah were married early in 1870.

"Daniel died 31 August 1894 at Fallsburgh. His obituary reads: 'Daniel R. Bonnell, a well-known and esteemed citizen, died at his home on Friday morning, Aug. 31<sup>st</sup>. He had been complaining for upwards of a year and for the past few months had been failing in both mind and body. His disease so worked upon his brain that at times he was unconscious of his acts.

On last Friday morning, while in an unconscious condition he took a knife and cut his throat which soon resulted in his death. He was aged 61 years, and is survived by a wife and nine children. He was born in the town of liberty on Nov. 30<sup>th</sup>, 1823, and was well known throughout the county, as he had been extensively engaged in dealing in horses and cattle for many years. He was twice married, his first wife, Sophia Hardenburgh, dying in 1868. He married two years later Sally A. Hotchkin, and was the father of nine children, five by his first wife and four by his second, all of whom are living.

Mr. Bonnell was a man of considerable wealth, and his many friends will learn with sorrow of his death. The funeral services were held at his late residence about four miles east of Liberty on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The services were conducted by the Rev. F. M. Turrentine, and the M. E. Church choir of Liberty led the singing at the services. The remains were interred in the Neversink cemetery.'

The following is from a CD copy of the "Biographical and Genealogical Record of La Salle and Grundy Counties Illinois" published by The Lewis Publishing Company, Chicago, 1900.

J. N. BUNNELL

One of the representative citizens of Morris is the gentleman whose name introduces this review, and who in his business and political associations has won the respect and confidence of the entire community. Many of the strongest characters of the nation have come from New England, and it is an indisputable fact that no other section of the country has shown more ingenuity, enterprise and diligence than are found in the New England portion of this republic.

Mr. Bunnell is a native of New England and possesses the sterling traits of character which distinguish his fellow citizens of that most civilized section of Christendom. He was born in Colebrook, Litchfield country, Connecticut, September 5, 1827, his parents being Willis and Elizabeth (Harger) Bunnell. They also were natives of Connecticut, were married there and made their home in the Nutmeg state until about 1844, when they removed to Delhi, Delaware county, New York, and there they spent their remaining days. Both have now passed away. They had a son and daughter, J.N. and Elizabeth, the latter now a widow, residing in New York city.

Mr. Bunnell, of this sketch, acquired an academic education, and at the age of twenty-five years was graduated at Berkshire Medical College, at Pittsfield, Massachusetts; but, preferring to enter upon a career in the commercial world, he never actively engaged in the practice of medicine. Going to New York city he became a salesman in a wholesale millinery establishment, and later entered the employ of a book house. Following this he was a member of the publishing firm of Bunnell & Price, which remained in business two years, when a fire destroyed their entire store. Their loss was so great that they could not resume business. During its existence the firm owned and published the New York Pickayune, a humorous sheet, which they sold just previous to the fire. For a short time after this disaster Mr. Bunnell operated under a contract, handling all the newspapers of New York which were sold in California. This was before the era of railroads to the Pacific coast and papers were shipped by way of Panama every two weeks. From his youth Mr. Bunnell has displayed considerable mechanical ability, turning wood and doing job work in that line in Connecticut. In that business he continued for about fifteen years, and in 1861 he secured a government contract to furnish gun-stocks. The life of the contract was two years, during which time he faithfully fulfilled his part and received for the goods one hundred thousand dollars. His next venture, however, was an unprofitable one. He organized a stock company,

thinking to conduct the wood-turning business on a much larger scale, but the stockholders were unprincipled and forced him out of the business.

He then returned to New York city, where he was variously employed for a considerable time. He acted as superintendent of agencies for Connecticut as the representative of the Equitable Life Insurance Company, with headquarters at Hartford, and later held a similar connection with the Globe Life Insurance company, his territory being Massachusetts, with Boston as his headquarters. Through the succeeding five years Mr. Bunnell, in connection with a partner, conducted a jewelry business in Newark, New Jersey, but the adventure was attended with indifferent success.

Entering the employ of the Straw Lumber Company, of New York city, Mr. Bunnell was sent to Lawrence, Kansas, in charge of the company's factory at that place. Six months later, in 1884, acting on the advice of Mr. Bunnell, the factory was removed to Long Island City, and later a factory was build at Cohoes, New York, of which he was made the manager. In 1887 he entered the employ of the Allen Paper Car Wheel Company, of New York, which sent him to Morris, Illinois, placing him in charge of its factory at this place. This position he held for 12 years, or until the factory was closed in 1899. In the spring of 1898 the Morris plumbing establishment of Bunnell & McNanly was opened and our subject is now in the plumbing and heating business. The firm receives a liberal patronage and their trade is now quite extensive.

Mr. Bunnell has been twice married. In 1858 he married Mary Beecher, who was a member of a branch of the Henry Ward Beecher family, and a native of Connecticut. She died in 1891, leaving a son Charles B., an artist of considerable ability, residing in Roseville, New Jersey. In 1892 Mr. Bunnell was again married, his second union being with Mrs. Eliza Marsh, of Newark, New Jersey. In his political views he has always been a stanch Republican in his allegiance to the party and its principles. While in Connecticut he was elected to the state legislature, in the fall of 1860, and during this service the assembly voted two million dollars for the prosecution of the war. He has been an active factor in local political interest in Morris, served as a member of the city council for five years, and in the spring of 1897 was elected mayor for a two-years term. His administration was progressive and businesslike, and he has ever exercised his official prerogatives to advance the welfare and progress of the city. While serving as a member of the Morris city council Mr. Bunnell was very active and untiring in his efforts to secure water-works for Morris; served as the chairman of the water-works committee, and, being a prime mover in the effort, much credit is due him for securing to the city its present magnificent waterworks. Fraternally he is a Knight Templar Mason and enjoys the high regard of his brethren of the craft. His business career has been a checkered one, yet through it all he has maintained an unassailable reputation for integrity and straightforward dealing. His pleasant, genial manner has won him many friends, and he is accounted one of the popular citizens of Grundy county.

A Bonnell House

On the next page is a recent acquisition from E-bay, a post card titled "Bonnell House, Bradley, New York." Bradley is located in Sullivan County, about 4 miles north east of Liberty. The card shows several folks standing around the house, though you may not be able to see them in this scanned copy. There are 9 women, 2 young girls, and 1 young man (early teens probably). I contacted Geoff Brown who lives in that area. In the last issue, we featured an article about his great grandfather, D.R. Bunnell who lived in the Liberty area. Geoff wrote back:

[&]quot;The last time I looked, the house was still there, and not changed particularly."



Kind of hard to say who the people are. I'm thinking this photo was about 1908, and that COULD make the younger blonde girl my mother – but that end of the Bonnell family was fairly prolific and it's hard to make that leap of faith. Further complicating matters is that like most people in that area at that time, the Bonnells took summer boarders, so there's no assurance that anyone in the photo is a family member (and not a summer boarder).

It's interesting that there is only one male in the picture, which, I guess suggests it was taken on a summer weekday, when husbands of boarders would have likely been in NYC and local men would have been at work. Possibly the young man is a summer boarder just young enough to be left in the country for the summer. Really hard to tell."

If anyone else has any info, please let me know and I'll put it in the next issue.

The Old Mine Road: Lois Mason, who owns the David Bunnell house in Walpack, NJ, mentioned in an e-mail that the book, The Old Mine Road mentions some of the Bonnells who lived in the Montague, NJ area. I was able to find several used copies for sale on Amazon.com and purchased a used reprint for less than \$10, including shipping. The Old Mine Road, by C.G. Hine was originally published in 1909 and reprinted in 1963. No one seems to know exactly when the road was built, but apparently it was around 1600 by the Dutch to haul copper ore from the area of the Delaware Water Gap to what is now Kingston, NY. The book is Charles Hine's description of his walking trip the length of the road [over 100 miles), the legends, tales and local history of sites along the way, and also offers several photos taken during his trip. It's actually a fun read.

Bonnells are mentioned only in the section about Montague Township. In Millville there was a Revolutionary War blockhouse that "was the headquarters of Capt. James Bonnell, who commanded at the Minisink during the Revolution." Thomas J. Bonnell of Port Jervis, had a "manuscript book in which his ancestor [Capt. Bonnell], first a Justice of the Peace and later a Captain, kept his record of trials,

copies of important letters, orders to the troops under him, petitions, etc." A half dozen examples are provided and if anyone would like a copy of those pages, just let me know and I'll copy them and mail them to you.

I figured that the Capt. James mentioned here is CB002976 and the son of Thomas. The Thomas J. mentioned would be CB002394, son of Isaac and grandson of James. Claude Bunnell and William Austin confirmed my assumption, with Claude adding, "He apparently spent most of his life in the military."

William Austin added, "I have grave doubts about his being the son of Thomas. The only authority for that is Snell's History of Sussex co, NJ. I don't know what became of the Captain's manuscript book. His son Isaac, in a letter to Jacob L. Swayze dated 22 July 1878 stated that his father 'kept a field-book of the many troubles and trials with the savages on the frontier. He was also a Justice of the Peace here, and his record was also kept in that book. The book contained the names of all who served on my father's command, and about 1820, James C. Zabrisky, of New Brunswick, a pension agent, came and got it and took it to Washington to be used as evidence when any of those who served under him should apply for pensions."

The question of the whereabouts of the manuscript was also brought up in Vol. 18, No. 2, page 28 by Alicia Batko who is the Montague Township Historian. She has been searching for this manuscript for some time. The letter from James' son Isaac, referenced by William Austin, would indicate that it was in Washington about 1820; The book was published in 1909 and the author implies that the grandson, Thomas J. had custody of the manuscript at that time. Alicia's query indicated that the manuscript may have been split up, which could explain this apparent disagreement between the sources.

<u>Our Family History</u>, by Ellsworth Harry Bunnell (CB361186), published in 1999 by Liebl Printing Co., Colebrook, New Hampshire. Ellsworth was a long time subscriber to the Newsletter who passed away this past January. We carried his obituary in the May issue. The Liebl Printing Company still has several copies of his book and will sell them to you for \$7.50 per book plus \$7.00 shipping anywhere in the USA. E-bay item. Here's an item that was recently offered on e-bay. While the write-up stated an expected value of \$150 to \$200, it actually sold at a standard auction for \$75 and was withdrawn from E-bay.

"New York Regimental Document. A period copy of the original Sept. 23, 1773 discharge for soldier John Bunnell, who was 'returned, unfit for service,' in Col. McDougall's Regiment, Capt. Lyon's Company, one page, oblong, octavo. The original document was signed by Col. McDougall and Richard Varick, who at that time, was military secretary to General Philip Schuyler. This 'true coppy' is in the hand of 'B. Carpenter' who may have been



the Vermonter Benjamin Carpenter, a Revolutionary officer and Lt. Gov. of that state in 1778."

Ed. Note: There are several John Bunnells in Claude's database that could be this John Bunnell. Cecil Bunnell took a stab at identifying him but said there just wasn't enough information to go on. Perhaps one of the readers knows of this John who was discharged. I don't know if he had to be from New York or could he have been from any of the colonies and just have enlisted in the New York Regiment. Can anyone shed some light on this?

William Austin's Comments

On page 59, Vol. 17, No. 4, there is a picture of Cora A. Bunnell. She was a friend of Pat's [William's wife] grandmother Ervin. Some time between 1912, when the Ervin's moved to Skinners Eddy, and 1920, when you found her in the DC census, Cora taught school in the Skinners Eddy school house and boarded with the Ervins when Pat's mother was a little girl. Pat thinks she never moved back to PA from Washington, but retired there. However, she did come back to visit from time to time, and Pat remembers seeing her at her grandmother's. This could not have been earlier than 1935 and probably not later than 1940. We have Cora's handbell that she used to call the children together. I use it to drive the bears away from the bird feeders.

On page 60 of the same Newsletter there is a picture of the 1912 Bunnell reunion. I have a collection of the pictures taken at the reunions, which started in 1905. I printed a copy of the 1909 reunion in Vol. I, No. 4. The 1912 reunion was held at the home of James Bunnell on Lacey Street in Laceyville. The house is still recognizable today from the picture.

My second book is over 25% complete, and I am trying to get back into working on it.
