BUNNELL, MARY JO Jodi was welcomed into her heavenly Fathers arms on November 5, 2007. She passed peacefully with her family and friends at her side. Jodi lived a wonderful life and was productive right until she was befallen with a massive stroke in recent days. Jodi was preceded in death by her husband, Tom Bunnell in 1999 and her son, Tom Bunnell, Jr. in 2005. She is survived by her daughter Priscilla Tulbert and her husband Ron of Plano, TX, and her grandson Brian Tulbert and his wife ...

Queries

Carol Perry, <u>litmen31@sbcglobal.net</u>, submitted a query/analysis on the Rootsweb Bonnell Message Board. I contacted her and offered to reprint it in the newsletter both for wider dissemination and to use as a demo for a pretty good analysis.

"Has anyone besides me ever questioned whether Charity DICKERSON, d.o. of Simeon and his wife Mary Slaght, was in fact the Charity who was the wife of Barnet Bonnell? As I was going over what is already out there on Barnet & Charity, I noticed that her d.o.b. was stated to be 1789, the same as Barnet's. She had nine children, the first in 1822 when she was 33 and the last in 1842 when she would have been 53. Could be done, but highly unlikely. That was the first red flag that went up.

Checking the U.S. Censuses, the one of 1830 had Barnet in Pike Co., PA, his household consisting of one male 40 to 50 (Barnet), one male <5, two females 20 to 30 (Charity had to be one), two females <5, and one female 5 to 10; there is no female 40 to 50, the age Charity would be if she had been born in 1789. A similar pattern for the 1840 Census for Middle Smithfield, Monroe Co., PA—Barnet's wife (40-50) is still 10 years younger than he (50-60). By 1850, Charity is found living with her daughter Eleanor and son-in-law Milton Armstrong in Milford, Pike Co., PA—her age is given as 50. Where Barnet is in 1850 is a mystery, I couldn't find him anywhere; in 1860 he is living with his son Isaac in Pahaquarry, Warren Co., NJ and there is no mention of Charity.

My conclusion is that Barnet's wife Charity, who was born abt 1800, not 1789, in New Jersey, was a different Charity than Simeon Dickerson's daughter and most likely was not a Dickerson at all.

Barnet, or Barnett, is a Bunnell in the database and is 310259. Carol is going to contact the submitter cited in my response below to try and find the original source.

Your excellent analysis seems to force that conclusion. The only source I've seen for her birth/parents is the IGI. In fact, the IGI also shows a Charity Dickerson, b.19 Sep 1789, marrying a William T. Hunt about 1806; and a Charity Dickerson, daughter of Simeon and Mary (Slaght) Dickerson as dying 30 Oct 1844. In all of these cases, there is no source cited. All of these Charity Dickersons are born in NY.

The source for Charity Dickerson being the wife of Barnett is also the IGI, but it shows this Charity Dickerson being born in Kingwood, Hunterdon co., NJ <u>ABOUT</u> 1790. The submitter for this info is available. So if you contact that person you might be able to obtain info on the source. The submitter was Mrs. George E. Barnhill; 117 South Park Street, Box 416, Sugar City, ID 83448.

Since those exchanges, Carol wrote to update me on her search.

"According to Beers "Commemorative Biographical Record of Northeastern Pennsylvania" at http://www.distantcousin.com/Other/NEPABio/Pages.asp?Page=0407, in the bio of Gersham Bunnell (b 1821), it is stated that Barnett married Charity Dickerson. However, there is no mention of her parents. Perhaps, this is where it all started? And then picked up by the IGI source cited in Claude's database that Charity was dau. of Simeon & Mary (Slaght) Dickerson, could it be because their Charity happened to be born in 1789 as was Barnett and seemed to fit the bill?

Then a breakthrough. It was in Wesley L. Baker's "Dickerson & Dickinson Descendants of Philemon Dickerson of Southold, Long Island, NY" that I found information that finally made sense. Not only does it say that Charity married William T. Hunt and that she died in 1844, but that Hunt, Simeon's sonin-law, was administrator of Simeon's will. There are enough details here that I find it hard to doubt this record.

Which brings us back to the question: if what Beers says is correct, what other Charity Dickerson could Barnett have married? Baker's book list only two Charity Dickersons, the one we have been discussing and the other the probable daughter (no DOB - 1832) of Thomas & Eleanor (Van Winkle) Dickerson and sister of Simeon and she was married to Zebulon Landon. Either there was another Charity Dickerson that Baker didn't know about, which is possible but I doubt it after seeing how thorough Baker's Dickerson genealogy is, or Beers is incorrect, which is most likely in retrospect."

I'm convinced that Charity, wife of Barnett Bo/Bunnell was not the daughter of Simeon & Mary Dickerson. So the question becomes, who were her parents. If you can add any information please let me know. While this may seem like a side issue, accuracy is again the quest.



Well, I've been on eBay again and here's my latest treasure. It is a picture postcard probably from the early 1900s. Problem is the only thing written on the back is "this is our new home. Mrs W. T. Bunnell." A banner hanging on the 2^{nd} floor porch says "Oak Leaf Hotel." No date or location is given. We don't know if the Bunnells are in the photo or not. There was one W. T. Bunnell in the 1930 census who was a barber in a hotel in Kansas City, MO. Can anyone help identify this place and which of the many W. T. Bunnells may have been living here?


Gayle also submitted a leaflet and some photos for a Herbert Bonnell Museum in New Market, MO. It is located a short distance off of the Dearborn exit off I-29, halfway between Kansas City and St. Joseph, MO. It's about 4 miles from Dearborn and a short distance from Weston, MO. The following material is from the leaflet. The photos of Herbert's parents were also provided by Gayle but are not part of the leaflet.



"Herbert Bonnell cherished the farm his family settled on in 1874, his art, and the arrowheads he collected in the area. A generous man, he shared his pencil drawings and showed his arrowheads to friends all his life. He wanted to continue to share after his death in 1984. Through the generosity of Mr. Bonnell, the house and farm he loved are now open to the public at no charge. Displayed inside the house are the many items needed to run a household and farm during the late 1800's. Outbuildings contain many rare objects and tools from a time when the farm was nearly self-supporting. ... The Herbert Bonnell Museum is open May 1^{st} – October 31^{st} , Saturday and Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Appointments can be made for weekday showings by calling 816-531-3466, 386-5587."

Gayle wrote: "The farm was on a rolling hill above the MO River valley flatlands. It contains 360 acres with very fertile soil. The corn was said to grow 10ft high. Also, he was one of the first farmers in the area to start a herd of pure bred Herefords. The people that knew him from the area said he was very conservative. He didn't buy anything he didn't need. He was one of the last in the area to get in- door plumbing even though he was a "man of means". He and his four sisters lived in the house. All four sisters graduated from Harden College in Mexico, MO. All four taught school and two of the sisters married. Herbert never married. He was conservative with his money but not with his time. He was very generous and helpful with anyone in need. He was a noted sketch artist and played the violin and fiddled folk music. He collected Indian artifacts he dug from his own place. Some of the pieces were very finely crafted and weighed 6 or 7 lbs."

Herbert is 003751 in Claude's database and his full name is Walter Herbert Bonnell. He was born 6 October 1893 in Platte Co., MO, one of eight children of Henry William and Josephine Florence (Brady) Bonnell (only 6 children survived to adulthood). Based on the article's statement that Herbert's farm was settled by his family in 1874, then this is the farm started by his grandparents William S. and Catherine (Shell) Bonnell. They had moved to Platte co, MO from IN with Catherine's parents in 1839 and then in 1846 moved to the Weston area. So this really is an old, family farm. William S. Bonnell, by the way, was born in Mercer co, KY and is part of the KY family that we are confident descended from William the immigrant, but have not been successful in connecting. Herbert died in November of 1984. Herbert's lineage is: William¹, Jonathan², William³, Henry⁴, Walter Herbert⁵.]

Gayle is a prolific contributor and often seems to find the most interesting and different pieces of material. You may remember that in the August issue last year he provided the material about the murder of John Bonnell by his brotherin-law Mark Salyers. This time the murder is only witnessed by a Bonnell, but it has severe consequences. Gayle provided the initial material and I was able to add some by using an excellent website for Kentucky research, http://www.kyvl.org/, supplemented further by Ancestry.com.

From an undated news clipping, likely the Lexington [KY] Herald on April 22 or 23, 1903: "Mrs Lucy Goebel McCarty, aged 20, was shot and instantly killed by her husband, William McCarty, aged 27, at the home of Mrs. Lizzie Swigert, No. 245 West Main Street, at 7:30 last night." The article is lengthy and drawing from other articles, it seems that Lucy had previously had her husband arrested for beating her and there was at the time of the shooting an outstanding warrant for his arrest. He was reportedly drunk and stated in court that he had seen her with a man in Lizzie Swigert's yard and became jealous. He was found guilty and a year later (about April 9th, 1903), after appeals, sentenced to be hung on May 15th, 1903. But the May 29th issue of the Semi-Weekly Interior Journal, Stanford, KY, 29 May, 1903 on page 2 reported that:

Cocaine and morphine in large quantities were found in the stomach of William McCarty, the condemned murderer, who committed suicide at Lexington."

But for us, Lizzie Swigert is the character of interest. She is Elizabeth Bonnell, daughter of Francis and Ellen

(Hurst) Bonnell and is 006468 in Claude's database. She was born 2 September 1867 and married Charles Swigert 15 march 1883. By the 1900 census she and Charles have 4 children: Elmore (1884), Frank (1887), Eva (1892), and Earnest (1894). Lizzie was the main witness to the murder and in fact she and Lucy ran together from William as he approached them in Lizzie's yard with the gun in his hand. Witnessing this incident was more than Lizzie could handle and the newspaper soon reported her as being mad. One undated news clipping, likely the Lexington [KY] Herald read: "RAVING - MANIAC'S MIND WAS DERANGED BY SCENES OF McCARTY MURDER - THINKS SHE WILL BE HANGED." A jury found her insane and had her committed to the Eastern Kentucky Hospital which has always been a mental institution. The paper went on to say that she had four children who will be cared for by their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bonnell. One daughter, Eva, was 10 years old at the time of the shooting and later testified in court. But with no mention of her husband Charles in the paper and with the grandparents taking the children, it would appear that Charles had died in the two years between the census and the murder.

The 1910 census shows her still in the Eastern Kentucky Hospital and she is listed as widowed. In 1920 she is living with a son, Elmore, who is 35 years old. Here she lists herself as married. I believe that is simply an error on the part of the census take. By 1930, she is living with her daughter Eva. Interestingly, both women list themselves as widowed though

Eva is using her maiden name. In each census year she is residing in Lexington, KY. Her death certificate states that she died in the Eastern State Hospital on 12 November 1947 at the age of 80. She was never able to testify at the trial of William McCarty and evidently spent several years hospitalized due to witnessing the murder.

Elizabeth is part of one of our unattached branches. Her lineage only goes back two generations: Her father was Francis Marion Bonnell and his father was Joseph Bonnell. Joseph first shows up in Virginia in 1801 as part of the Loudon County Militia.

More of the material that Carol Brotzman, <u>brotzmans@epix.net</u> or R.R. 1, Box 1206, Laceyville, PA 18623, has been scanning and sending us from some old books and old scrapbooks she salvaged.

The following items are from Leo Bolles' diaries. Carol came into the Bolles family records from Mrs. Anna Labzentis Bolles, beginning on August 22, 1999, and thereafter through 1996. The materials were loaned for copying, organization and conservation. Anna, and her deceased husband Robert Bolles (1926 - 1998), obtained the records through Robert's adopted father, Leo Bolles (1887 - 1959). Leo was a noted early historian of the area, and kept diaries, pictures and notes on just about everything.

Bunnell, were united by the laws of holy matrimony at the home of the bride's aunt, Mrs. Theo. Williams, at Owego [NY], Jul 22, 1911 at 7 o'clock by the Rev.Riley A. Bose, pastor of the Baptist church at that place, after which they enjoyed a wedding supper, served by Mrs. William to a small number of their near relatives.

The bride was dressed in thin white and wore a picture hat.

Sherwood - Bunnell

On Wednesday evening, June 21, 1905, at 8 o'clock at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walker Bunnell, James Murray Sherwood and Miss Eva Bunnell were united in marriage by Rev. L. E. VanHoesen. Harry B. Sherwood, a brother of the groom was best man and Miss Lucia Tweksbury was bridesmaid. Miss Edna Crawford played the wedding march. The bridal party stood under an arch of evergreens while the simple and beautiful service of the M. E. church was in progress. After the young couple were pronounced man and wife they received the congratulations of about 100 guests. The wedding presents were many and beautiful consisting of a large variety of silverware, fine chinaware, table linen, rocking chairs, Morris chair and two fine clocks. The couple are well known Meshoppen [PA] young people and have the best wishes of a large circle of friends. After a few days stay at this place they will commence housekeeping at Brooklyn, N. Y., where the groom has a fine position. [Evelyn is 341486; William¹, Benjamin², Benjamin³, Solomon⁴, Benjamin⁵, Benjamin⁶, Benjamin⁷, Walker⁸, Evelyn⁹.]

Research Findings

The state of Kentucky now has many of the vital records on line and you can download a copy of the original document at no cost. Much of the following birth, death, spousal and parental data is now new, but the certificates contain additional information that may prove useful to researchers. For example finding out that the person who provided data for the certificate (the informant) was the son or daughter, rather than the spouse, of the decedent may provide other clues; finding out the cause of death may be useful for those interested in tracking medical histories. I'll include another 5 next issue. CBID is the number in Claude's database.

From *Minutes of the Proceedings of the Trustees of the 1st Presbyterian Church at Paterson New Jersey*. Paterson was in Essex Co, but that area is now in Passaic Co. which was formed in 1837. On March 10th, 1813 it was decided that the members of the church would subscribe a fixed amount annually for expenses such as retaining a clergyman. A total of 19 people subscribed, one of them being Thomas Bonnell. Seven members were to pay \$10 per year, one \$8, four \$5, one \$4, three \$3, two \$2, and one (Thomas) \$1. It appears that the subscription and amount were voluntary.

[Ed. Note: I can't be sure which Thomas Bonnell this is. The 1810 and 1820 census for NJ were destroyed or lost so I can't cross check it there. The 1830 census shows a Thomas Bonnell in Essex co, but in Springfield rather than in Paterson. Since those two towns were 20 miles apart, I don't believe it is the same Thomas though he could have moved during the intervening 17 years.]

From Pioneer History of Milwaukee, from 1840 to 1846, Inclusive, Volume 2, by James S. Buck, 1881

Page 119

[1842]

Shepard & Bonnell (Clarence Shepard and James Bonnell) came this year in October, with the largest stock of hardware and general merchandise (twenty-eight thousand dollars' worth) that had, up to that time, ever been brought here by any one firm, which they opened in the south tenement of Dewey's Commercial Block. Lansing Bonnell and a man named Huntington also came at the same time as clerks.

N. S. Donaldson was in the north tenement with dry goods; and weeks & Miller (Dr. Lemuel W. Weeks and Henry Miller) were in the center store with general merchandise.

I think Shepard & Bonnell had the most crowded store (except old Reed's second hand store in Boston) that I ever was in. It was almost impossible to move about, there were so many goods. They were soon compelled to seek new quarters, which they did in the fall of 1843, at what is now 39t [sic] East Water. Here they remained until December, 1849, when the late Henry Williams became a partner and they removed to Geo. F. Austin's new block, now known as Nos. 283, 285, 287, 289 and 291 East Water, where they did a large business, under the firm name of Shepard, Bonnell & Williams. In 1850 Mr. Shepard retired, and the business was conducted by Bonnell & Williams for two years more, when they removed to Nos. 297 and 299 East Water, where they remained three years, when Mr. Williams also retired, and Mr. Bonnell went it alone, at that and other localities, the last being the southwest corner of Michigan and East Water, where the Messrs. Houghton Brothers now are, which had been rebuilt for him, until 1873, when he retired from business altogether. His smiling face, however, can be seen almost daily upon our streets, as he comes around to see his old acquaintances, and revisit the scenes of his former business life. Time has dealt kindly with Mr. Bonnell, and his form is as erect and his eye as bright as a boy's. He looks you square in the face when speaking to you, and is always happy to meet his old business acquaintances, and talk over the olden time. Mr. B. is about to go into business again in Chicago. May good luck be his, wherever he goes.

[Ed. note: James and Lansing Bonnell were brothers who moved to Milwaukee from NJ. Lansing later returned to NJ. While the article implies that James may have ended up in Chicago, the 1900 census shows him still in

Milwaukee. James is 002511 and Lansing is 002760 in Claude's database. They are descendants of Thomas Bonnell who arrived in NJ from England. Their lineage is: Thomas¹, James², Isaac³, James⁴ & Lansing⁴.]

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European Research

In the last issue we showed you a sample of a will from 1638 and our attempt to translate that portion of it. Well, Bill Austin wrote and offered to translate it if we sent him a copy, which we immediately did. Two weeks later we had a complete translation. It does not provide us a connection to William the immigrant, but it is great reading.

Comments by William Austin, translator:

"Line 2 – The English kings held on to the fiction that they still ruled part of France and had a claim to the throne of France long after the issue was dead.

Line 3 – The town of Picton is a few miles NNW of the city of Chester in Cheshire.

Line 10 - "my base sonne" we would write as "my illegitimate son".

Line 10 - "6£.14s.4d." read as "6 pounds 14 shillings 4 pence".

Line 13 – "pide kalfe" read as "pied calf".

Line 17 - "xs" read as "10 shillings".

Line 24 – "bearbrude" is the closest I come on this man's occupation, but it can't be correct and, so far, the similarity of the small letters has me stumped.

When I get a chance, I will tackle the inventory. Apparently, he was very well to do. I note that he had 5 draft horses, a lot in those days."

Last Will and Testament of William Bunnell of Picton, Cheshire, England, 19 May 1638

In the name of god amen. The 19th day of maye in the 14 year of the Raigne of our Souweren Lord Charles by the grace of god King of England Scotland France & Ireland defender of the faith &c. & anno dei 1638. I William Bunnell of Pickton in the County of Chester veoman being sick in body but of good & perfect memorie praise bee to god doe make this my laist will & testament in manner & forme as followeth. First I bequeath my soule to almighte god hoping for saluation by Christ. Item. I bequeath my body to such solom burial as shall seeme fit to my Executors. Item. My funeral expenses debts & legacies discharged, I give the one halfe of my personall estate to my Wife Thomasin Bunnell. The other halfe I give to my sonne Samuel Bunnell & my daughter Alice Bunnell to be equally devided betwixt them. & if it fortune that either of my said children Samuell or Alice depart this life before they be married or have power by law to make a will that then the portion belonging to that child shall wholly remaine to the survivor. Item. I give to William Bunnell my base sonne the some of 6£.14s.4d to bee paid at the feast of Sainte Michaell the arkangell next & to be put into the hands of John Bunnell my brother to be imployed for his best profit & advantage. Item. I give my sister Elin Bunnell one yeare ould kalfe. Item. I give to Elizabeth Taylor my god child one pide kalfe of an yeare ould. Item. I give 3s.4d. towards the mending of the Way towards the Church from Pickton. Item. I give to Roger Sexton my god child 3s.4d. & I likewise give to Sarah Bennett my god child 3s.4d. Item. I give to Alice Bethart? My servant one heifer of 2 yeares ould. I give alsoe to Nicholas Short my late servant 5s. I give alsoe to Elizabeth Harison my late servant 5s. I give to my servant Elin Prince 5s. Item. I give my god child William Cooke 8s to be employed for his best profit by his parents. Item. I give to Mr. Holford xs. And of this my last will & testament I make constitute & asppoynt Thomasin Bunnell my Wife & Samuell Bunnell my sonne my lawfull Exekutores, & doe also appoint & intreat? John Leech Esquire my landlord to be ouerseer of this my will & the things contained theirin to be performed & doe leave him the some of 5£ for a legacie. In witnesse whearof I have herto put my hand & seale the day & yeare first aboue written revoking all former testaments herby. Debts owing mee without bonds or bills or other securitie

While surfing on the Google Book Search website that Stephen Bonnell provided us a while back, I found several books of interest; over 900 for Bunnell and double that for Bonnell. Here are some dealing with England.

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Read, Mrs. Elizabeth C. Bunnell, journalist and woman suffragist, born on a farm in Dewitt township, near Syracuse, N.Y. on Christmas eve. 1834, the fifth child in a family of four boys and five girls. Her father, Edmund Harger Bunnell, was born in Connecticut, the son of Nathan Bunnell and Betsey Ann Ashley, daughter of Dr. John Ashley, of Catskill, N.Y., and his wife Elizabeth Johnstone, of the Johnstones of colonial fame. Her paternal grandfather was a soldier of 1812, and his father was a Revolutionary hero. One of her brothers, Nathan Bunnell, enlisted at the age of seventeen, in Company A, Twentieth Indiana Infantry, was wounded at Gaines Mill, VA, taken prisoner, and died in Libby prison, Richmond, VA., 12th July, 1862. When Elizabeth was fourteen years old, her parents removed from New York to Indiana, where, within six weeks after their arrival, her mother died. Business ventures proved unfortunate, and the family circle was soon broken. Before she was sixteen, Miss Bunnell began to teach school.

Having an opportunity to learn the printing business, she determined to do so, and found the occupation congenial, though laborious. She served an apprenticeship of two years, and then accepted the foremanship of a weekly paper and job office in Peru, Ind. That post she filled four years. At the end of that time, in January, 1861, she commenced the publication of a semi-monthly journal called the "Mayflower," devoted to literature, temperance and equal rights. That paper had a subscription list reaching into all the States and Territories. On 4th March, 1863, she became the wife of Dr. S. G. A. Read. In 1865 she removed with him to Algona, Iowa, where they now live. There she began the publication of a weekly county paper, the "Upper Des Moines," representing the interests of the upper Des Moines valley, which at that time had no other newspaper. She commenced to write for the press when about twenty, and has continued as a contributor to several different journals. A series of articles in the "Northwestern Christian Advocate," in 1872, on the status of women in the Methodist Church, led to their more just recognition in subsequent episcopal addresses. In church membership Mrs. Read is a Methodist, and in religious sympathy and fellowship belongs to the church universal. She is deeply interested in all social and moral problems. The unfortunate and criminal classes have always enlisted her most sympathetic attention. She is now associate editor of the "Woman's Standard," of Des Moines, Iowa. A journal devoted to equal rights, temperance and literature. She was vice-president of the Indiana State Woman Suffrage society, while residing there, and has been president of the Iowa

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State Society and one of the original members and promoters of the Woman's Congress. She has lectured occasionally on temperance, education and suffrage. She is generally known in literature as Mrs. Lizzie B. Read.

The second article I found through http://books.google.com is about Cornelia Bonnell in Women Workers of The Orient, by Margaret E. Burton and published by The Central Committee on the United Study of Foreign Missions in 1918. The article was very interesting and mentioned that Cornelia graduated from Vassar in (mistakenly) 1897. That led me to Jackie Hoffman, who is the Information Services Specialist for the Alumnae and Alumni of Vassar College. She provided more information that I added to other data gleaned from searches on the web, to include Claude's database. The following is the culmination of that research. I had never heard of the lady before, but Cornelia is a forgotten heroine and I hope this keeps her story alive a little longer.

Cornelia Leavenworth Bonnell

Cornelia L. Bonnell was born 24 June 1874 in Waverly, Tioga County, NY, the daughter of Benjamin and Frances (Leavenworth) Bonnell. She had a brother Guy, born about 1872, and a sister Nancy, born 1882. Cornelia is a descendant of the immigrant Thomas Bonnell as follows: Thomas¹, James², Isaac³, Jonathan⁴, Benjamin⁵, Cornelia⁶. Cornelia is 004933 in Claude Bunnell's database.^{1, 2}

She was evidently a bright young woman as she was admitted to Vassar College in 1889 at about the age of 15³ and she was one of nine honor graduates out of 53 class members.⁴ One article states that she was the youngest student ever admitted to that college.⁵ Several articles attest to her poor health and indicated that she was seriously ill. After graduation she wanted to pursue missionary work, but no doctor would certify her healthy enough to satisfy the Missionary Board.^{5, 6} She worked for a short time as the assistant secretary of the Baptist Women's Missionary Board, in Boston, MA. She spent the winter of 1896-97 in the Missionary Home in Newton Centre, MA.⁵ At some point she had become convinced that God wanted her to work in China.

Because of the Board's refusal to certify her, she took a private position as a teacher in "Miss Jewell's Private School in Shanghai." in 1899, teaching the children of American and British residents.^{5, 6} However, the 1900 U.S. Census shows her residing with her parents and sister in Waverly, NY and her occupation is "missionary, China."

While teaching, she spent time learning the ways of the city of Shanghai and learned of the buying and selling of young girls. Many of the referenced articles provide different descriptions of the practice, but essentially very young girls were paraded through the streets of one section of Shanghai and sold as concubines or prostitutes. In November 1901, without the support of any missionary board, she opened the "Door of Hope" to rescue and care for these young girls and other children.^{6, 7, 8} The articles imply that she opened a separate "Receiving Home" in the heart of the prostitution district on Foochow Road, ⁹ though from the way the articles are written I can't be sure if there was one facility or two. At least part of the means of supporting the mission was through the sale of goods made by the young girls. This also taught the girls a trade by teaching them sewing skills and dressmaking. Stuffed dolls, which are very collectible today, were made by the girls and dressed to "represent various types of Chinese characters, ages and stations."⁷

Evidently Cornelia traveled and returned to the United States periodically, possibly for fund raising purposes or to visit family and friends. As stated earlier she was with her family in 1900 for that federal census; however the basis of the trip may have been fund raising. The Baptist Missionary community appears to have provided some degree of support to her Door of Hope as she and her endeavors are written about in several Baptist Missionary publications. At least one of her leaflets, "The Spirit of the Poppy," is mentioned as being on sale by The Baptist Missionary Magazine.¹⁰ In 1911, a Baptist Church in Waverly (assumedly New York) held an exposition where representatives from various Far East missions set up booths, "illustrating life in many lands." In one booth "... are seen rare curios, including the collection of Miss Cornelia Bonnell, one of our members engaged in rescue work in Shanghai."¹¹ "For the first four decades of the Door of Hope in Shanghai, the largest donations came from abroad, from Bible schools, women's groups, church congregations, and individuals."¹²

On the 20th of June 1912, while living in Shanghai, she applied through the Consulate for a passport. Her stated purpose was to "travel via Russian Dominions."¹³ On the 19th of December that year, she departed Liverpool, England aboard the SS Celtic and arrived in New York City on the 28th of December. Her address in the U.S. was to be: 1024 Hudson St, Hoboken, N.J.¹⁴ It appears to be an apartment building; looking at the 1910 census for Hoboken Ward 2, District 50, that address has 7 families living there. Other buildings in that same area are also multi-family buildings.

Cornelia died 12 October 1916.³ Her passing was noted in the 1917 <u>Woman's Federation Bulletin</u>, published as part of *The Missionary Review of the World*. The article stated, "Those who read in The Review recently the most interesting account of the "Door of Hope" in Shanghai will grieve to hear of the death of the founder of this work, Miss Cornelia Bonnell. …"¹⁵ She apparently died in Shanghai and most likely was buried there. The Door of Hope operated in Shanghai until 1951, at which time it relocated to Taipei. Her work resulted "at least" 5000 women being cared for at the Shanghai Door of Hope by the time it closed.¹⁵

There were also a number of similar missions using the name "Door of Hope" started in New York City in 1875 by Emma Mott Whittemore and her husband Sydney. By 1931 there ninety-seven homes in that system called, collectively, the Door of Hope Union.¹⁶ I could find no apparent relationship between Cornelia's home and those started by Mrs. Whittemore.

B. BUNNELL was born in Ross County, Ohio, April 2, 1807, and is the fifth of the twelve children born to Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Donaven) Bunnell. He was an infant when his parents moved to Warren County, Ohio, and in April, 1816, they moved to Clark County, where he was employed on the home farm until he was twenty-one, after which he worked out until October 1, 1834, when he came to Big Creek Township, this county, and bought 160 acres of wild land, on which he built a hewed-log house, and there worked out a farm, which he increased to 335 acres, a part of which he has since conveyed to his children. He was married, August 16, 1832, to Sophia Bumgardener, daughter of Andrew and Felicia (Lynch) Bumgardener, natives of Virginia, and of German and English descent. She was born in Spring Valley, Ohio, August 23, 1810, and died in this township January 23, 1883, a life-long member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the mother of eight children, of whom four are still living; of these, one son-George W.-was a soldier in the late war for over three years. Mr. and Mrs. Bunnell were among the ten members who formed the first Methodist Episcopal Church ever organized in White County, near Big Creek, in the township of that name, in 1834,

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under the Rev. air. [sic] Clark. Mr. Bunnell is a Republican, and is one of the oldest surviving pioneers of the county.

[Ed. Note: this is Barzilla Bunnell and is 320319 in Claude's db. His lineage is William¹, Nathaniel², Nathaniel³, James⁴, Stephen⁵, Nathaniel⁶, Barzilla⁷. There are a couple of inconsistencies here however. (1) the bio specifically states that he is one of twelve children born to Nathaniel and Elizabeth Bunnell. The database shows 6 children born to Nathaniel and Blizabeth and 5 more born to Nathaniel and 3rd wife Nancy. No mention is made of the second wife in the bio, though it was published nearly 50 years after the marriage of Nathaniel to Nancy. Supposedly, Nathaniel married (2) his brother David's widow, Elizabeth (Price) Bunnell and was appointed guardian of 3 of David's minor children.]

DNA & Genealogy

Ellen Bonnell's father, Milton, recently received the results of his DNA test. Their lineage was shown in the August 2007 Newsletter in Ellen's Direct Line. It traces back to a John Bonnell who was born in GA in 1778. This line may connect to the Bonnells of Screven Co., GA, and thence to the French immigrant Daniel Bonnell (abt. 1690 to SC), but we've not been able to make that connection. The DNA test only showed that there is no connection to the other Bonnells and Bunnells who have already tested. What we need now is a known descendant of Daniel Bonnell to have a DNA test.

On the surface it may seem that the testing is of small value, but we are still in the baseline development stage. As more people participate, we should have more connections. Eventually, we may be able to connect not just Ellen and Milton, but many others to their specific immigrant.

Post Script

This issue we're starting a new section titled "European Research" which will provide data relating to Bonnells/ Bunnells in Europe. This is not just in furtherance of the search for William the immigrant's parentage, as we have many families who descended from later immigrants, including those from countries other than England. Like other sections of the newsletter, we will only include that section when we have some material.

A recent experience reinforced our belief that all records are potential sources of erroneous information. Being retired military we sometimes, while traveling, use the lodging facilities at military installations. Last year, after calling ahead for reservations, I was surprised to find that our reservations were in the name of Chief Master Sergeant Charles Burnwell (they did get the military rank correct). This month when we showed up, after phoning for reservations, I was surprised to find that I was now Colonel Barnem. Wow – a promotion and a name change. This just highlights how creative we must be when researching 200 year old records when the literacy level was far lower than it is today.

In St. Augustine, FL at the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Augustine (billed as America's first parish, founded September 8, 1565), is a monument to the Minorcan colonists who helped settle the area. One of the family names listed is "Bonelli." Minorca is an island in the Mediterranean Sea, belonging to Spain. At the time of the Minorcan migration to Florida, Minorca and the St. Augustine area belonged to England.
