Jean Seigley, 454 W. County Road 38, Tiffin, OH 44883, sent an article from The Advertiser-Tribune, Tiffin, OH Friday, March 13, 2009. Jean and I would be interested to know if anyone can fit the Bunnells in this article into the family. The article relates a chain of 10 kidney swaps among strangers. It started when a Matthew Jones decided to donate a kidney after hearing about a man donating a kidney to a stranger. Jones was matched with "Barb Bunnell, a 53-year-old Arizona woman whose husband wanted to donate a kidney but was incompatible. ... Bunnell's grateful husband, Ron, then became what [Dr. Michael] Rees believes is the world's first 'bridge' donor, meaning his kidney donation was made later." Ron donated a kidney to woman in Toledo whose mother then donated a kidney to a woman in Columbus, OH whose daughter in turn donated a kidney. And the chain went on.

Donald Wayne Bonnell, 72, a resident of St. Clair Shores for 40 years, died Monday, Feb. 19, 2007. He was born Dec. 8, 1934, in Carlisle, Pa.

## Submissions

In the previous issue, February 2009, on page 7, we reported on a Robert Jack Bunnell who died as a POW during the Korean War. Neither Claude nor I could find anything about his parents or lineage. Jane Bailey, 1301 Richard St., Miamisburg, OH 45342 volunteers at the Warren County, OH Genealogical Society library and did a bit of digging and provided some information for us. She said that she tried to find a marriage record for Ella & Robert Bunnell plus her marriage to a \_\_\_\_\_ Kaylor in Warren County. She is going to keep digging.

From the Warren Co. Ohio newspaper, 20 Aug 1953:

**"Franklin Soldier Dies in Red Prison; No Word Yet About Local Prisoners.** ... Mrs. Ella Kaylor, Franklin, whose hopes soared two weeks ago when a newspaper listed her son, Sgt. Robert J. Bunnell, 30, a POW, was informed Friday by the Defense Department that he was one of the 1,022 American servicemen to have died in prison camps."

Kaylor Mrs. Ella B. **Kaylor**, 86, of 521 River St., Franklin, died Oct. 4 at Middletown Hospital. She was preceded in death by her husband, Robert, and a son, Robert **Bunnell** who died in 1951. She is survived by her son, Edmond **Bunnell** of Trenton; one daughter, Gwelda **Hart** of Franklin; one brother, Charles **Keplinger** of Carlisle; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Graveside services were held Thursday, Oct. 9, at 10 a.m. at Woodside Cemetery in Middletown. Funeral arrangements were by Eaton-Anderson Funeral Home.

From the above we know that Richard was born about 1923. In Ella's obituary I was not sure if the deceased husband Robert was a Bunnell or a Kaylor. I did some further digging and found on Ancestry.com obituaries from the Delphos Daily Herald, Dec. 5, 2006:

Gwelda Marie Hart, age 87 of Franklin, OH passed away September 11, 2006 at Hospice of Dayton. She was born August 31, 1919 in Middletown, OH the daughter of Edmond and Ella **Bunnell**. She is preceded in death by her parents; a husband Robert in 1996; a son, Bobby Hart; a brother, Robert **Bunnell**. She is survived by three daughters, Judy **Thomas** and husband Jim of Franklin, OH, Donna **Hayslip** of Miamisburg, and Sandy **Vaughan** and husband Jeffrey of Centerville, OH; a brother Edmond **Bunnell** of Trenton, OH. Eight Grandchildren, Amy **Sarff**, Toby **Thomas**, Robbie **Hayslip**, Ryan **Hayslip**, Ashley, Danielle, Fallon, Jackie **Vaughan** and six Great Grandchildren. Funeral Services will be Thursday, September 14, 2006 at 1:00 pm at Anderson Funeral Home(1357 E. 2nd Street, Franklin, OH 45005) Visitation will be Wednesday evening from 5-8 pm at the funeral home. We now have her birth date and, more importantly, her father's name: Edmond. Therefore, the deceased Robert mentioned in Ella's obituary must be a Kaylor.

1900 Census, Middletown, Butler Co., OH, Horace Bunnell, Head, b. Jan 1876 OH, married 3 yrs; Mamie Bunnell, Wife, b. Feb. 1877 OH; Edmond, Son, b. Jan. 1898; Ray, brother, b. Apr. 1878; Horace and Ray both list their occupation as Laundryman.

1910 census, Franklin, Warren Co., OH, Charles (46) and Ida Keplinger (44) with children Ella (10) and Charles (4).

1920 census I cannot locate an Ella Keplinger, Kaylor or Bunnell of the right age or marital status nor any of her three children anywhere in the U.S.

Ohio State Death Index, from Ancestry.com: Edmond A Bunnell, d. 10 Oct. 1924 in Butler Co., Ohio

1930 census:

Madison, Butler Co., Ohio, Frances Goodwin age 27, wife Ella Goodwin, age 30, motherin-law Ida Keplinger age 67. [If this is the same Ella, then this is a marriage not mentioned in any of the material above. Did she later marry a Kaylor? Where are the children? I'm not confident his name is spelled "Frances" rather than "Francis"]

Turning to Claude's database, the easiest find out of the above names is for Ray Bunnell (342049), son of John W and Margaret (Beedle) Bunnell. John is 331008 in the database. John and Margaret had 8 known children, including Ray and Horace listed above. Horace is 342047 in the database and married Mary Kraft, who in the census reports her name as Mamie. They had 4 children, to include Edmond who is currently shown as Edward Edmond in the database.

The Robert J. Bunnell that started this quest is 008157 in Claude's database and he and his brother and sister can now be attached to Edmund Bunnell along with their mother Ella (Keplinger) Bunnell. Thanks to Jane Bailey's digging and sharing of information we can now show Robert's lineage to be:

Henry Bunnell + Hannah Clark Abner Bunnell + Ann Scudder William Bunnell + Mary Cassaday John W. Bunnell + Margaret A. Beedle Horace E. Bunnell + Mary (Mamie) Kraft Edmond Bunnell + Ella Keplinger Robert J. Bunnell

This still leaves questions such as where were the children in 1930 when their mother appears to have married a Frances Goodwin and what happened to him and who is the Kaylor that Ella next married?

Interestingly, Henry Bunnell & Hannah Clark take us back to the mid 1700s in Union and Essex Counties, NJ which is the same area for the next discussion.

Steve Bonnell, <u>BNL\_dna@kbsb.com</u> or 1523 Good Shepherd Rd, Montoursville, PA 17754, has been busy collecting information and sent material telling the story of Hannah Bonnel and John Rague. Hannah is 002878 in Claude's database:

*The Todd Genealogy or Register of the Descendants of Adam Todd*, by Richard Henry Greene, A. M.; Wilbur & Hastings, Publishers, New York: 1867. Pg. 71, Footnote:

"During the Revolution a French surgeon came to this country with General Lafayette, whose name was John Francis Rague. This Dr. Rague was with the American Army when the winter quarters were near Morristown, N.J. and with other young officers, having little or nothing to do, endeavored to relieve the monotony of camp life by such amusements as they could get, which were often only practical jokes; one of these threatened to end seriously, and Capt. Bonnell prevailed on Dr. Rague to go to his [Capt. Bonnell's] residence, which was near Morristown, and remain there until the difficulty was settled. A few days after Capt. B. wrote to Dr. R. that he might return, and was answered that he could not under three or four days. When he did return he reported to Capt. B. that he had fallen in love with and married his sister Hannah Bonnell during his absence. Dr. Rague and Hannah his wife had a daughter Catharine, who m. Jonas Stansbury, and from this union was b. Mary Cecilia, April 21, 1806, ..."

Page 215:

John Little, (son of George,) was most probably the father of Samuel Littell, of Essex county, who was born about the year 1780, and married Lydia Bonnell, and had children: [Note: The names of 14 children are listed; Lydia appears to be 280018 in Claude's data base, however her date of birth is 167\_; about 110 years earlier. But it's unlikely that two Lydia Bonnells married two Samuel Littels 110 years apart. I'm inclined to believe that Claude's database has the correct date.]

Page 340:

Dr. John Rague was a Frenchman, he married Miss \_\_\_\_\_ Bonnel, the aunt of Lois, wife of Gabriel Johnson, Esq, and lived in Passaic Valley. They had children:

1. Betsey, who was brought up by her cousin, Lois Johnson, and married ----

2. Catherine married Jonas Stanbury, son of Capt. Samuel Stanbury, and lived on Long Island.

3. James went to Urbana, Ohio, and married Polly, a widow, and daughter of Coats Thornton, of Champaign Co., Ohio, and had children:

1. Lemuel, who married harriet Samples, daughter of Bethuel, of Urbana.

2. Liewelen, who was a Lieut. in the U.S. Army

#### 3. John F. Married in New York, and lives in Iowa City.

The third document is a collection of records pertaining to the service of John Rague and his wife's application for pension. It provides several key data: (1) Death date of Hannah Bonnel 3 Jun 1849; (2) Tells a story of the whirlwind romance between John and Hannah; (3) Asserts that John was presented a sword by Lafayette; (4) Shows that John was born 14 Sep 1748 Paris France, died 16 Oct 1798; (5) Thomas Bonnel was Hannah's father and that she had a sister Apphia Bonnel Tichenor. Some believe that it proves Hannah had a brother Israel Bonnel who married a woman named Fanny. While they are mentioned I saw nothing that indicated Israel was Hannah's brother.

A statement by John C. Budd, age 75, notarized by Israel Day.

"... he became acquainted with Doct John Rague at Battle Hill in the County of Morris, state aforesaid who was at that time a Surgins mate in the Pennsylvania line Army of the United States in time of the Revolutionary War, that he came to said place by the immediate direction of Capt James Bonnel, the reasons for his leaving camp was that a difficulty had taken place between him the said Doct John Rague and a brother officer, and while at Battle Hill was married to Hannah Bonnel now Hannah Rague, in which time the difficulty became settled and the said Doct. John Rague returned to the Army and remained in the Service of the United States as Surgeons Mate until the close of the war and the Army disbanded. At which time the said Doc. John Rague came and settled in the neighborhood of Battle Hill and remained within a few miles of the same until his death and Hannah Rague the widow of the said Doct John Rague is still living.

John C. Budd"

A statement by Israel and Fanny Bonnel [sic], notarized by Israel Day (not sure of spelling), Justice of the Peace, Essex Co., NJ on 2 December 1836:

"Personally appeared before me Israel Day \_\_\_\_\_\_ of the Justice of the Peace in and for said county Israel Bonnel and Fanny Bonnel his wife each over the age of seventy one years who being duly sworn according to \_\_\_\_\_\_ on their oath say that they were well acquainted with Doct John Rague in the time of the Revolutionary war that he was at that time in the Army of the United States and was Surgeons Mate in said army at which time he was married to Hannah Bonnel of Battle Hill in the County of Morris state aforesaid and that he continued in the Army of the United States until the close of the war and the Army disbanded and that the said Hannah Rague the widow of the said Doct John Rague is still living and that they lived at the time of his marriage \_\_\_\_\_\_ to Thomas Bonnel the father of Hannah Rague and frequently saw Doct John Rague in his Regimentals.

Israel Bonnel Fanny Bonnel"

Two pages of a letter out of an unknown number of pages, dated Dec. 16, 1928, from a Burnett T. Kirby of New Hampton, IA to the Pension Bureau:

"... Dr. Rague as surgeon in the Revolutionary War ... came from Paris France with Lafayette and was given the Lafayette sword as a token of friendship. His youngest son, I believe was Frances Rague ...

John Rague, a soldier of the Revolution [born] Sept the 14<sup>th</sup>, 1748 Paris France."

On the bottom of a typed letter from the U.S. Pension Commissioner Winfield Scott, is a hand written entry. There is no indication of when it was written or by whom.

"Widow's sister, Apphia Ticheron was living in 1836, then aged 68 years, & one Israel Bonnel and his wife Fanny both aged over 71 years, were testified in Essex Co N.N. in 1836."


This bit of information piqued my interest and, as usual, sent me off searching for more information. The presence of Israel Bonnel and Thomas Bonnel in the same area, with most references spelling their names the same, would seem to infer some connection. Thomas Bonnel, father of Hannah, shows up in Morris Co. in 1766. Snell's history of Sussex & Warren Counties states that Thomas arrived from England. The Israel Bonnel cited is 310319 in Claude's database and his lineage goes back to William the immigrant. His wife is Fanny Hand and they lived a good part of the lives in or near Chatham, Morris County, NJ. So, unless Snell was mistaken, any relationship between these two individuals must go back to England. However, I was able to find some other interesting material regarding Bonnels in that part of NJ.

From History of Morris County, New Jersey, W.W. Munsell & Co., Publishers, New York, 1882.

"The early history of the village of Chatham forms, of course, part of the general history and settlement of the township, which has been given. The part of the town lying upon the Passaic took the name of the town, as the upper part was called Bottle Hill and afterward Madison. Bonneltown was that portion lying between the village proper and New Providence." On the map below, are the three areas mentioned. Madison is a little over 2 miles from Chatham and Chatham is about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles from New Providence. Israel spent his life in Madison and Chatham,

# From *Brief History of Chatham, Morris County, New Jersery*, by Charles A. Philhower, 1878, New York, Lewis Historical Publishing Co.

Page 38: "Industries — One great factor in the attraction of settlers to this locality was its water power which was caused by a slight fall in the flow of the [Passaic] river over the remaining terrace of the terminal moraine of the glacial period. This in fact was the most deciding element in the



location of the village. There were mills at four different points in this immediate vicinity; one at the crossing of the Passaic by the road to Elizabeth Town, one at the crossing of Summit avenue, one at the crossing of the Shun-pike in Bonneltown," That would place the last mill about where the black square is on the map. Today, just to the left of that square is Bonnell Street.

Page 40: "In an issue of the New Jersey Journal in 1780 there is an advertisement of the vendure of a farm which was located about a mile from Chatham near the "Old Mill." This old mill could have been none other than the mill at Bonneltown, at one time called 'Goose Town,' and suggests by its name that a mill was built at this crossing at an early date. The name 'Bonnel's Mill' was applied very appropriately to the mill situated in this locality since it was

owned and operated for a number of years by members of this family. Later it was known as Franklin's mill of Bonneltown. ...Further up the river was located the old paper mill. The principal product of this establishment was pasteboard. Jonathan C. Bonnel was the first proprietor of this business." Bonnel's Mill or Franklin's mill cited in this paragraph should be the same one marked on this map. Jonathan Crane Bonnel, cousin of Isaac, leased the Franklin Mill in 1822, but the

Palladium of Liberty Newspaper, from Morristown states that the mill was aabout a mile up river from Chatham. The paper mill may have been run by the brother of Israel Bonnel.

Through Google Books, I found a snippet of what must be the will of Thomas Bonnel, father of Hannah. The portion available on-line reads: "...Son, Henry, ½ of my land joining Daniel Burnet and John Genung. Son, James, £20. Son, Benjamin, was given the house and land I bought of David Ward. Son, Joseph, rest of land. Daughters, Hannah Rague, Phebe Bonnel and Affa Bonnel, my moveable estate. Doct. John Regue is to have none I gave to Hannah. Executor - Son, Joseph. Witnesses - Aaron Carter, Moses Genung, John Roberts." From this snippet I would have to conclude that there were some hard feelings between Thomas Bonnell and his son-in-law, John Rague.

Back in March Steve Bonnell, was contacted by Elaine Folkins, daughter of Carolyn Anne (Bonnell) Folkins [CB352644], and grandaughter of John and Olive (Smith) Bonnell. She provided the following family history:

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"Over the years we have found out numerous new info about our family, but there are still questions. Not much is known of my grandfathers immediate family. We know that he had two birth certificates. This was to do with being able to sign up for the military. He was married twice and having two large families. Most of his first family still reside in Buffalo, NY. His second family, my mothers, still reside in Sussex and area New Brunswick, Canada. Not sure how this connection evolved. Apparently, when my grandparents got together they had a son which they eventually put up for adoption, whom we have now found named Doug Arnold, original name being Owen Bonnell. They then proceeded to have another son (Gerald "Ted" Bonnell) and decided that they should marry. Then proceeding to have more children, Harold, Patricia, Richard, Carolyn, Vaughn Owen. Sad stories from there evolve. Richard and Vaughn Owen were both killed, [victims of drunk drivers]. ... Ted and Harold have both also passed away. Leaving my mother and her sister Pat, and the new found brother Doug left alive. My mother might be able to help you trace some other facts. I was wondering if you may know how we may be part of your tree. Please email me @ folkfrye@nb.sympatico.ca."

Using Claude's database, Steve was able to send Elaine her lineage back to William the immigrant. John is Bunnell rather than Bonnell, 341056, in Claude's database. Elaine then provided some additional data including some previously unknown Bunnell/Bonnells:

My mother says that her fathers name was John Calvin Bunnell or Bonnell(he spelled it both ways). His first wife's name was Mary E. Bunnell. Mom said that his first wife is buried somewhere in the US. I did some research on mom's half brother Charles William Bunnell, from her father's first marriage. He was in the military. He is buried in Brettevill-Sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery. He was a gunner for the Royal Canadian Artillery died age 26 June 9, 1944. He was married to a woman named Elizabeth Bunnell of Barker NY, USA. Mom can't remember all of her aunts and uncles on her father's side, but some names she does remember are the sisters: Annie and Katherine (who are buried in the Caldwell cemetery in Penobsquis) There may be more. From her father's first family she remembers these names as his children: Carson (who was the man who raised my mother), Calvin, Harry, Fred, Jean, and Charles (who they called Bill) and there was another boy David who was put up for adoption. Thanks for checking into this for me and maybe you could help me to fill in some blanks. You see most everyone has already passed on and no one left to tell the stories.

Surry County, VA Bunnells

Hezekiah Bunnell, 1704 rent rolls listed 150 acres of land held by her Majesty in Surry County, VA.

Hezekiah Bunnell appeared in "VA Colonial Militia 1651-1776" listed as a foot soldier. I have no idea what happened to him after that.

William Bunnell & Anne Bunnell christened daughter Selah Bunnell on Feb. 14, 1748, Albermarle Parrish, Surry County, VA

William & Anne Bunnell, Albermarle Parrish Registry, Surry County, VA lists a son William Bunnell born 9/5/1747.

William Bunnell found in the Albermarle County, VA Census (Pg. 4) white male between 14 & 26 years of age.

William & Anne Bunnell in the Albermarle Parrish Registry 1717 to 1778, Surry & Sussex Birth, Deaths & Marriages lists their 3 children as Selath, William, & Johnson

A few months ago I received the following e-mail:

Hello from Shanghai, Peoples Republic of China.

My name is Mike Mauser, I'm a retired professional firefighter from Kentucky now working for Dow Corning Corporation in Shanghai , China . I have been married for almost 23 years to Jennie Marie Clifton-Mauser and we have a Daughter Lauren Elizabeth who 20 at LSU and a Son Bryan James who is 16 and attending the British International School - Shanghai. I was born on July 24th, 1964 at UK Hospital in Lexington , KY as Robert Allen Bunnell the Son of the late Paul Lewis Bunnell and the late Dorothy Marie Forbis and was relinquished at birth. I was adopted just before my first birthday and given the name Michael James Mauser. I was raised in the Northern Kentucky town of Bellevue in Campbell County and graduated from Northern Kentucky University in Highland Heights . I first made contact with my Birth Mother Dorothy in March of 2006. Dorothy and I talked on the phone daily and I made a few trips down to Cave City and stayed with her. I moved to China in November of 2006 and sadly she passed away on 31 July 2008.



My adoptive Mother passed away in 1998 and it was at that time that I started searching for my biological family. In 2004 I was lucky enough to obtain a Kentucky Birth Index Book and located my birth certificate number at which time I learned my given name; Robert Allen Bunnell Birth and my Mothers name; Dorothy Bunnell. I also received my "non-identifying information" from the State and it was then I learned about my siblings and other information about the family. It spoke of my Fathers family and mentioned

that all his brothers and sisters lived near their home place except for a brother who lived in Michigan. After a few failed attempts, I first met with Dorothy in March of 2006 at her home in Cave City, Kentucky. Her first words to me were "I never thought this day would come"... It was a happy day!

[Ed. Note: Mike Mauser (Robert Allen Bunnell) is the first child of Paul (CB028107) and Dorothy (Freeman) Bunnell. They had three children listed in Claudes database: Peggy Ann, Bobby Ray,

and Terry Lewis. In 1964 Paul married Virginia Poynter. From that marriage there were four more children: Paul, Nancy, Mitchell and Ruby. Mike (Robert) is a first cousin, once removed, to Geneva (Bunnell) Grady, wife of John Grady. I shared this info with John some time ago and they have been in contact with each other since then. This whole family is part of what I have referred to as the "Lost Kentucky Tribe."

John Grady also sent me some additional information that can now be added to the database: John wrote: "I knew Dorothy, and her second husband, Wm. Henry Forbis (1908-9 Mar 2000, Horse Cave, KY). Dorothy, to me, was a very intelligent, well-bred lady, as the old saying goes. Apparently she and Paul Lewis had an extremely rocky marriage. Additionally, we heard from Judy (Poynter) Ballard, daughter of Virginia and step-daughter of Paul Lewis Bunnell. So the following is a compilation of data from Mike, John and Judy.

Paul Lewis and his second wife, Virginia Ruth Basil Martin Poynter:. She, was b. 9 Aug 1926, Barren Co., Ky., and she died 1 Apr 2007, Barren Co., Ky., at T.J.Samson Hospital. Paul was b. 19 mat 1924 and died 18 Oct 2000. Both she and P.L. are buried in the Horse Cave Cemetery. Yep, ole Paul Lewis was husband #3 for her. They are the parents of four (4) children [note: Mike Mauser believes it was 3 children, excluding Ruby. I should have the definitive answer next issue.] 1. Paul David Bunnell, b. 1 Mar 1964, Barren Co Not married.



"William L. Bonnell.-Numbered among the progressive young business men of Columbus is William L. Bonnell, who is vice president of the B. &T. Company, dealers in linoleums and floor coverings. He was born at Bucklin, Missouri, March 24, 1895, the son of Mark and Anna (Saucer) Bonnell.

Mark Bonnell engaged in the general mercantile business throughout his life. He was born in Indiana in 1849, and spent his early life there. He later went to Missouri, however, and conducted a general mercantile establishment at Mansfield for several years. He died in 1914 and is buried at that place. His wife, also a native of Indiana, died in 1901, at the age of forty-one years, and is buried at Princeton, Kansas. Their children were: Mrs. Mellie Morgan, lives at Albion, Michigan; William L., the subject of this sketch; and Mrs. Leila Olsen, lives at Albion, Michigan.

William L. Bonnell received his education in the public schools of Mansfield, Missouri, and as a young man learned the machinist's trade. In 1921 he came to Columbus and at that time took an active part in the organization of the B. & T. Company with William Thompson. Mr. Bonnell is

vice president of the concern, which is located at 135 North Front Street. Their business is wholesale, as well as retail, and extends throughout a large area in Ohio.

On September 10, 1915, Mr. Bonnell married Miss Willa Davis, at Springfield, Missouri. They have a son, Walter L., born September 6, 1919.

Mr. Bonnell is independent in politics. He holds membership in the First Presbyterian Church, but has no club or lodge affiliations. The family lives at 76 North Princeton Avenue, Columbus."


