A RECENT INQUIRY

Over the last thirty years almost 350 people have sent me information about the Bunnell/Bonnell family. Much of it has consisted of their ancestral lines worked out to the immigrant Bunnell. However, there have also been many, many fragments of unconnected data which I have tried to keep track of until I could find a way to fit them in. I recently received an inquiry from Carol Rilling, Sierra Vista, AZ, and thought you might be interested in seeing how some of these fragments come together.

A RECENT INQUIRY (Cont'd)

Mrs. Rilling's letter read as follows:

"Would you be willing to tell me if you have anything on the following relative?

HENRY BONNELL
b. ca. 1740? New Jersey?
m. Hannah ______? b. c. 1736
d. 23 Aug. 1764 (age 28)
Connecticut Farms, New Jersey
d. +9 April 1777 New Jersey

Henry Bonnell had a daughter, Esther, b. c. 1765; m. Moses(6) Thompson; d. 6 Oct. 1796 New Jersey.

These families are found in Essex County, New Jersey in towns like Elizabethtown, Westfield, Connecticut Farms, Union Township, etc."

I do not have the answer for Mrs. Rilling in my compiled records of the descendants of William Bunnell or in the unattached families. However, I keep a notebook of miscellaneous unconnected notes and pieced together some of them as follows:

- 1. On page 452 of Volume II, THE PASSAIC VALLEY, NEW JERSEY, by John Whitehead, LL.D., 1901, we find: "William Baker, Jr., was born in Westfield, February 20 1788, and married Jane R. Thompson, who was born May 3, 1790, daughter of Moses and Esther A. (Bonnell) Thompson, the former being a son of Hezekiah Thompson, who is mentioned in history on account of his valiant service in the War of the Revolution."
- 2. One item of a collection copied by Homer E. Baldwin and sent to me on 6 November 1959: "In Hezekiah Thompson Family Bible, N.J. in possession of Donald Beam, 35 Stiles St., Elizabeth, N.J.

Moses Thompson, b. Nov. 6, 1764, departed this life July 14, 1809; Esther Bonnell, wife of Moses Thompson, b. Oct. 5, 1765, and departed this life Oct. 6, 1796."

- 3. Letter from Robert L. Ross 10 December 1970: "... Also I have the following records of Bonnell marriages.
- 1) Moses Thompson, son of Hezekiah and Jane (Ross) Thompson married as his first wife, Esther Bonnell dau. of Henry Bonnell 2nd. They had Nancy and Jane R (b. 1790). Moses married second Polly Winans and had 6 children."
- 4. Several people, including Homer Baldwin, Philip Lacy and Marilyn Lynch sent me copies of cemetery inscriptions in the Connecticut Farms Presbyterian Church cemetery in what is now Union co, NJ. Included was: "Hannah Bonnel, wife of Henry, d. Aug. 223, 1764, age 28 yrs."

A RECENT INQUIRY (Cont'd)

5. From a letter written to Miss Marian E. Biles, 12 June 1960 and passed on to me by Miss Biles. The letter is signed "Marcia."

"I have been able to do something with the Clark family. . . . As you know Pheobe Winans' mother was a Clark. I think you told me about the will of Jotham Clark, her father. We have gone through the wills of New Jersey, as they are published in the New Jersey archives. This is the Clark family as we trace it.

IV. Jotham (son of John, son of Richard, son of Richard), born 1700-05, died in Elizabeth in 1772. Left a wife Sarah _____. His will mentions

- 8. Hannah, married Henry Bunnell, deceased by 1772."
- 6. Homer Baldwin, Mrs. John Hegeman and Marilyn Lynch each sent me a copy of the abstract of the will of Henry Bonnell taken from the Calendar of Wills in the New Jersey Archives, First Series, Vol. XXXIV, 1771-1780. I have not seen the printed archives myself, and each of the copies I have varies slightly from the others. Piecing them together, this is probably a fairly accurate version of the abstract:
- 9 Apr. 1772, Bonnel, Henry, of Borough of Elizabeth, Essex Co., Will of. All real and personal estate to be sold. Wife Prudence £30 (£24?), and the rest of the money to be used to bring up my children. sons Abner & Henry to be bound out to trades when they are old enough. Executors, Daniel Wade and Elias Whitehead, my 2 brothers-in-law. Wit: Timothy Whitehead, Sarah Whitehead, Joanna Whitehead. Proved Aug. 9, 1777. Lib. 19, p. 181.
- 7. A Family Group Sheet compiled by Mrs. John Hegeman for ABNER BUNNELL says he was born 5 October 1760 in Essex co, NJ, and died 26 April 1835 at Union Village (Shaker) Warren co, OH, age 74. He came to Warren co, OH, about 1804 and joined the Shakers about 1805. The source of Mrs. Hegeman's data is given as the microfilmed Shaker records at the Warren co, OH, Museum.
 - > That is all the pertinent data from my book of miscellaneous notes, so now we turn to Claude Bunnell's Database. He has

1765, Elizabeth Boro, Essex co, he made the inventory for the probate of an estate.

26 July 1779, Elizabeth, Essex co, Timothy Whitehead lists his daughter Prudence Bonnel in his will.

A RECENT INQUIRY, (Concl'd)

From the GENEALOGICAL MAGAZINE OF NEW JERSEY:

24 July 1764 New Providence, Essex co, NJ, the funeral service for his wife Hannah was conducted by Rev. Jonathan Elmer of the Presbyterian Church.

From the PROCEEDINGS of the New Jersey Historical Society:

1764, Union co, NJ, wife Hannah was buried in the Connecticut Farms Churchyard at the age of 28.

From the Essex co probate records:

1772, Elizabeth, Essex co, Will of Jotham Clark lists daughter Hannah, wife of Henry Bunnell. 9 Aug. 1777, Elizabeth Boro, Essex co, Will of Henry Bonnel, lists wife Prudence and sons Abner and Henry underage.

26 July 1779, Elizabeth, Essex co, Will of Timothy Whitehead lists daughter Prudence Bonnel.

From all these fragments we can compile the following, keeping in mind that much of the data comes from handwritten copies, none is directly from primary documents, and the evidence for the connection of the various items is mostly circumstantial.

HENRY BONNEL, 2d, CB300091, parentage unknown, was born probably in Elizabethtown, Essex (now Union) co, NJ, sometime around the year 1730. By the end of 1754 he was old enough to serve as administrator of the estate of Isaac Ward (a relative?). He married (first) HANNAH CLARK, daughter of Jotham and Sarah Clark. She was born about 1736 and died 23 August 1764. She was buried in the Presbyterian Churchyard at Connecticut Farms (now New Providence), NJ. Henry married (second) PRUDENCE WHITEHEAD, daughter of Timothy Whitehead. Henry wrote his will 9 April 1772 in the Borough of Elizabeth, Essex co. He died before 9 August 1777 when the will was probated. The will mentions his wife Prudence, children, including specifically sons Abner and Henry, underage, and brothers-in-law Daniel Wade and Elias Whitehead. His widow Prudence died 29 September 1784.

- 1. Abner, b. 5 Oct. 1760.
- 2. Henry b. ?
- 3. Esther A., b. 5 Oct. 1765; m. Moses Thompson; d. 6 Oct. 1796.

Children, (surname Thompson):

Perhaps other daughters not specifically mentioned in the will or other children born after the will was written in 1772.

In pursuing the search for Henry's ancestry, there are a number of clues lurking in all of this, the most intriguing of which is the reference by Robert L. Ross that Esther Bonnell was the daughter of Henry Bonnell the 2nd! Who was Henry Bonnell the 1st?

GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Paul J. Bunnell, Marstons Mills, MA, wrote that his parents celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on 7 June 1991.

JAMES HENRY BUNNEL, SR., CB001147, son of George Woodbury and Maria (Bertogli) Bunnell, was born 20 January 1921 in Amesbury, MA.

LORRAINE MURIEL VIOLETTE, daughter of Albert and Alma (Belanger) Violette, was born 6 May 1925 in Beverly, MA.

James and Lorraine were married 7 June 1941 at St. Joseph Catholic Church, Amesbury, MA. They have three sons, all born in Amesbury:

James Henry, b. 20 Sept. 1942. Paul Joseph, b. 28 July 1946. Michael Norman, b. 6 Jan. 1953.

In 1953, shortly after their last son Michael was born, the Bunnells moved to the San Fernando Valley, Los Angeles, CA, to seek better employment opportunities. Lockheed Aircraft Co. was the biggest employer, and that's where Jim found work. After one more job change, Jim finally retired from Stainless Steel Corp. in Burbank, Ca. After the sons were married, Jim and Lorraine moved to northern California. Always in love with the outdoors and camping, they spend most of their time with Mother Nature.

They made one more move, to Oregon, in the 1970's. Today they live in the small coastal community of Florence, where their backyard is attached to a State Park filled with hiking trails, streams and pine trees and sand dunes.

Besides being a wonderful loving father to his three sons, Jim's accomplishments have been many and varied. He was a long distance track runner in high school and a champion ping pong player. During Word War II he took part in the D-Day invasion in Europe and finished his service in the Pacific Theater at the surrender of Japan. He was a stainless steel engineer of metal works, an excellent carpenter and outdoorsman, aircraft builder, bookstore owner, campground caretaker at Mt. Shasta, CA, and an adventurer of the northwest.

For their anniversary, many friends and family members met at the home of their son Michael in Palmdale, CA. The anniversary party was the first family reunion between east and west coast relatives in the past ten years. Following the party, Jim and Lorraine left for a trip to Alaska, a place they had always wanted to visit. The trip was a surprise gift from their sons.

Jim is a great-great grandson of Benjamin Bonnell, the Loyalist, CB006839, about whom Paul wrote in his book, THUNDER OVER NEW ENGLAND.

Florence Buck sent in the following article from THE WEEKLY ALMANAC, Honesdale, PA. It is a pleasure to reprint it for you:

Kenneth M. Bunnell Serves With Both Patience And Persistence

Kenneth M. Bunnell had told his wife, Betty, last year that would be his last Flag Day program. Twenty-one years was long enough, he thought then. She knew better. It wasn't long before he was writing his 22nd program.

The flag day program is one of the dimensions of Boy Scouting and other community service to which Mr. Bunnell has given his time and talents. It was an outgrowth of scouting when he and members of Troop 103 sought a way to properly dispose of old flags, according to the flag code. The first program was held at Gravity Park at the Horseshoe at the edge of Honesdale. Howard Loring and Mr. Bunnell got an old wind-up phonograph, using records to play bugle calls. Then the program moved to the Elks Home, and eventually to the Fair Ave. location.

A program that involved just a handful of scouts and adults grew to a major community production involving many veterans groups, girl and boy scouts, and public officials.

The Flag Day program reflects much of the life of Kenneth Bunnell.

He was born just upstream from this year's Flag Day program site in the old Kimble House, a hotel, where the Fairway Restaurant is today. He is the only child of Mervin L. Bunnell and the late Esther M. Pease Bunnell.

After graduating from Honesdale High School in 1937 he went to work at Lange's Cutrite Store located in the theatre building. He was there for eight years before moving on to Bunting's Market, where Stendor's Market is today, staying there three years. He had been working at Allen's Ice Cream Store on Main St. for three years, when Robert Fisch convinced him to give banking a try. So, for the next 33 years, he was at Honesdale National Bank, retiring as a vice president and trust officer.

He is married to the former Betty Theis of Tyler Hill. They have three children: Marilynn Jaggers of Honesdale, James of Bethany, and Susan Graziadio of White Mills.

As a scout, and scouter, he has given 57 years. He joined Troop 1, attended the National Jamboree in 1937; earned the Eagle badge and four palms; and, has been a scoutmaster or assistant scoutmaster at Troop 2, which at the time was sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church, Honesdale; and Troop 103 at Central Methodist Church. He has been a committeeman, and served various capacities of the District.

"You know, I left scouting for 23 years," he said. He became involved in girl scouts; the Central Methodist Church on the administrative board, and served there as treasurer for 27 years. He was the auditor for the school district and the borough for 18 years; served as borough treasurer for 15 years; was exalted ruler of the Elks Lodge where he was involved for 20 years; a trustee and was treasurer for the Wayne County Historical Society.

In recent years, he has given time to the Stourbridge Railroad tours of the Wayne County Chamber of Commerce. He has risen there now to conductor. His granddaughter, Colleen Bunnell, serves with him as his coach captain.

BUCKINGHAM LODGE IN BONNELL PARK

Lynn E. Arnold, Cincinnati, OH, has submitted several clippings and pictures telling the story of the house built by Aaron Bonnell in 1852 on Camargo Road, Indian Hill, Hamilton co, OH, just outside of Cincinnati.



Aaron Bonnell CB005596, son of Moses Bonnell CB002142 and Hannah (Buckingham) Bonnell, purchased 185 acres of land in Symmes twp, Hamilton co, for \$1200 in 1832. In 1837 Aaron married Margaret Dackey. They lived in a log cabin until 1852, when the present house was built, mostly from lumber on the acreage. All but the front is walnut weather boarding. The front is pine. The house is a fine example of Italianate block architecture popular between 1840 and 1860. A porch was added

later, probably at or before the turn of the century. It has since been removed. A large frame barn which stood west of the house burned many years ago.

After Aaron's death in 1882 the property was divided among his four sons, George Dackey, William Jones, Leandrew A.. and Moses F. Bonnell. William Jones Bonnell CB005600 lived all his life in this house. He married Florence Buckingham in 1882. They had two children, Lola Louise and Harold Lee Bonnell. William died in 1922 and Florence in 1932. Lola never married, but continued to live in the old homestead for the rest of her life.

She was deeply proud of her Bonnell and Buckingham heritage, and she loved her little farm, now consisting of 13 acres. She managed the farm herself, raising her own produce, which she generously shared with neighbors and friends. She owned a cow named Lilly Bell and her calf and also several chickens, each of which had a name. David Meyer remembers that as a boy he cut her grass for \$1 with a hand push mower and that he had strict orders to steer carefully around the little crosses that marked the graves of those feathered pets. The henhouse still stands amid a clump of over-grown shrubbery. A cistern with an old crank handle pump still exists by the roadside.

The Bonnell house was left to the village of Indian Hill by Lola Bonnell when she died in 1966, with the stipulation that the house be called Buckingham Lodge and the adjoining 13 acres be called Bonnell Park. "... my intention in naming said Park Bonnell Park and said building Buckingham lodge... to preserve in perpetuity the said Indian Hill pioneer names."

BUCKINGHAM LODGE IN BONNELL PARK (Concl'd)

In 1988 the village scheduled the house for demolition, planning to develop the land for home sites. The Indian Hill Historical Society, in the person of its president, Virginia White, went to the village officials and asked them to allow the Society to preserve the home and restore it. She acted not a moment too soon, since the demolition crew began its work that very day.

The CINCINNATI ENQUIRER, 17 July 1990, quoted Ginny White: "The home's old wood mantel above the fireplace already had been hauled away. But we save the remainder of the house. We then raised \$35,000 from our membership. The village matched that amount. The restoration costs will be around \$70,000. We plan to make the home a museum open to the public and also will offer it as a meeting place for small groups."

We can be grateful toe the Indian Hill Historical society for preserving this lovely old home, so different in its design from the Rural Gothic style of the Bunnell House at Homer, MN, built about the same time, and preserved by the Winona County Historical Society. (Newsletter Vol. IV, No. 2)

[Letha Bunnell's husband, Rupert Bunnell, was born 16 April 1819 and died in May 1986, according to his listing in Social Security Deaths compiled by Cambridge Statistical Research Associates, Inc. The National Registry of Living Bunnells, 1990 edition, lists Rupert Bunnell (actually his widow) living at 700 W. Fabyan Pkwy, Batavia, IL, 60510. Son James does not appear in the Registry in Arizona.

Claude Bunnell's Database lists only one Rupert Bunnell, CB001955, who appeared in the telephone directory in 1949 living at 1516 W. Victoria St., Chicago, Cook co, IL. This is probably the same Rupert. Can anyone add anything more to this family?}

In Volume !V, No. 4, of the Newsletter I reprinted an article about the induction into the Mansfield University Alumni Athletic Hall of Fame of George Lewis "Duke" Bunnell, CB340332. Notice of his death appeared in the Tunkhannock, PA, NEW AGE-EXAMINER for Friday, 9 August 1991, in the regular column on local athletics, "Casty's Lines," by Stew Casterline:

"Jim Welch Sr. called Wednesday with the news that George 'Duke' Bunnell had passed away in New York State. Bunnell was probably the greatest coach in the history of Tunkhannock High School and anyone who every played for him will testify to that fact.

Coach Bunnell, a native of Meshoppen, graduated from Mansfield and came to THS in 1934 and coached until 1957. He spent two years in the Marines during WWII but in the 21 years that he coached football the Tigers went 117-59-12. He is best remembered for the stretch from 1953 to 1957 when the locals compiled a phenomenal record of 42-1-1. In fact, the Class of 1958 went 27-0-1 during their three years of varsity football.

He was also an outstanding baseball coach and led the Tigers to seven District 12 titles, six Back Mountain League titles and one Suburban title in his last year at the helm.

In addition, Bunnell led the 1957 Tiger volley ball team to a state title and also spend six years coaching basketball, and one year he doubled as track and baseball coach.

I was only 10 when 'Coach' moved on to Wellsville, N.Y., and the only thing I ever did for him was carry water, but from all I've heard from his former players, he was truly a legend. Condolences to his wife, Diane, and their son. He'll be remembered forever in Tigertown."

The wedding musician was Mark Rice.


A reception was held at the church.
