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## MORE ON THE BONNELL BLOCK, ERIE, PA

Jerry Hatch sent in the following from the March 1992 NEWS & NOTES, the monthly newsletter of the Erie County, PA, Historical Society:

"Although the front of the Bonnell Block does not show it, the work on the renovation of the building is nearing the half-way mark. The structural reinforcement has been completed. The framing of the various rooms, stairwells, and elevator shaft is complete as is much of the drywall work on the first floor. Interior painting will begin in early March. The rough plumbing and electrical work is being completed. The new heating, ventilating, air-conditioning system is being installed. The masonry walls for the third floor extension are up and the new roof has been installed on the front portion of the building. The new doorways between the History Center & the Cashiers House have been cut and the new front windows are installed. The elevator and the steel trusses for the third floor are scheduled to be delivered the last week in April. Owner occupancy is scheduled for July 6th.

"The current plan is to use the summer to set up the furnishings & equipment, get the library & archives moved in from the Cashiers House & W 9th St., and set up additional period rooms in the Cashiers House. A general exhibit featuring current ECHS collections will be set up in the exhibit gallery for the summer with the first major exhibit, 'A Survey of Erie County Industry' installed about October 1st for the grand opening of the Erie History center. Initially visiting hours will remain the same with the reading room and exhibit gallery open Tues. through Sat. from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Cashiers House open for tours Tues. through Sat. from 1 to 4 p.m. with school tours in the mornings, Once the building is fully operational, hours will be expanded to include more weekend & evening hours."

A telephone call from Mr. Charles Sluder, Westminster, MD, gave me the distressing news that his wife Katharyn died last year. She was one of the subscribers to the Newsletter. Besides our correspondence, she and I had talked on the phone several times. She was very seriously ill for many months, and much of her family research had to be done while she was bedridden. She was a descendant of Titus CB310126 and Mary (Cook) Bunnell of the North Carolina branch. Much of the information I have on Titus and his brother Asa was supplied by Mrs. Sluder.

Even more shocking was the death of Robert A. Bunnell, third son of Claude Bunnell. Claude called me to let me know that Robert's obituary would be in the next packet of materials he was sending. In his short life Robert accomplished more than most people do in their allotted three score years and ten. Here is his obituary from The Washington Post of Friday, 3 April 1992:

Robert A. Bunnell, 37, a former vice president for public affairs of the Airport Operators Council International who had been an aviation writer for the McGraw-Hill publishing company in Washington, died March 30 at St. Francis Hospital in San Francisco.

Mr. Bunnell, a former Arlington resident who lived in the Washington area from 1975 to 1990, was born in Wilmington, Del. He graduated from Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, and he received a master's degree in journalism and public affairs from American University.

Before joining McGraw-Hill in 1984, Mr. Bunnell worked for the Reston Times and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. In 1989, he became a vice president of the Airport Operators Council International. In 1990, he moved to the San Francisco area and founded Value Communications, a public relations firm specializing in aviation matters. He lived in San Leandro, Calif.

Mr. Bunnell was a member of the National Press Club and a founder of its Toastmasters International chapter.

Survivors: his parents, Claude and Sara Bunnell of Longboat Key, Fla., and four brothers, Steven Bunnell of Chadds Ford, Pa., David Bunnell of Santa Cruz, Calif., Donald Bunnell of Glenn Mills, Pa. and Thomas Bunnell of Wilmington.

Interment was in Arlington, VA.

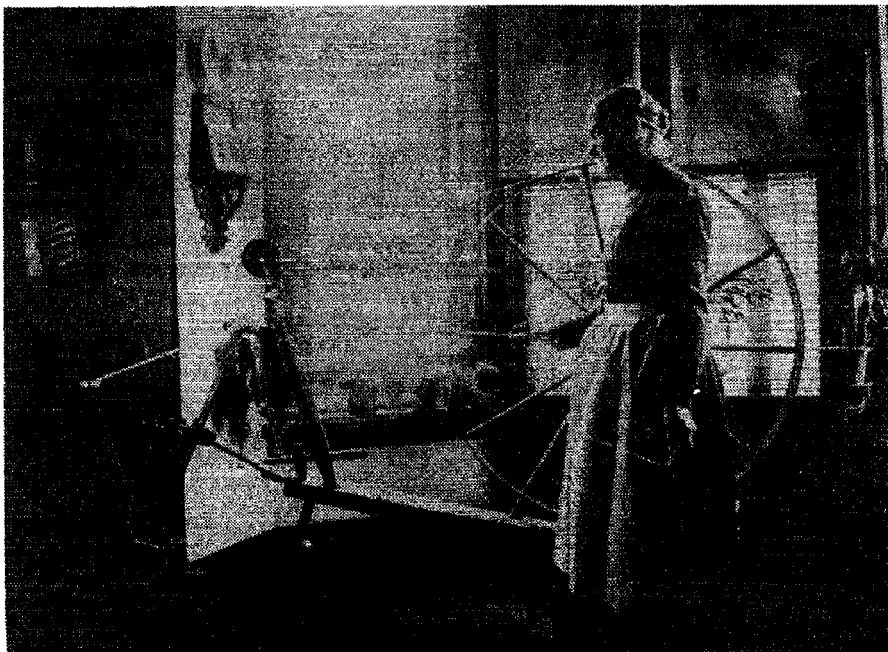

HELEN BREWER BUNNELL, 85, a church volunteer and resident of Detroit, died Monday of heart failure at the Arnold Home in Detroit. Mrs. Bunnell was a volunteer at Greenfield Congregational Church in Dearborn where her husband, the Rev. Myron Bunnell, served as minister from 1942 to 1953. Besides her husband, she is survived by daughters Patricia and Virginia; son, Richard; nine grandchildren, and 12 great-hhhnbbbbbbbbbbbbgrandchildren.

In going through some old family pictures I ran across this photograph of Amanda (Bunnell) Chamberlain, wife of Rev. Gilbert Chamberlain. She was my wife's great great grandmother. She was born 3 March 1831, the 12th child and youngest daughter of John and Mary (Place) Bunnell, whose picture I showed you in Volume II, Number 4. She and Gilbert Chamberlain were married 29 September 1853. They had two daughters. Amanda died 6 February 1917. The picture was taken in her home in Meshoppen, PA.



## THE BONNELL TAVERN

Like an old dowager who has outlived even her own grandchildren, the old Bonnell Tavern stands at Clinton, NJ, empty and unused, cut off from the modern world, inhabited only by the ghosts of its illustrious past.

The Tavern has been owned by the Bonnell family continuously through seven generations. The owner today is Clement M. Bonnell, III, of Milford, NJ, great-great-great-great-grandson of Lt. Col. Abraham Bonnell, who purchased the property in 1767. Clem provided most of the information on which this article is based as well as the pictures which illustrate it.

Abraham Bonnell CB300042, son of Abraham and Mary (Shinn) Bonnell, was born 4 August 1732 in Kingwood twp, Hunterdon co, NJ. At the early age of twenty years he began the purchase of large tracts of land from the West Jersey Society. By the time he was forty he had bought almost 2000 acres, most of which he sold, as favorable opportunity presented itself.

In 1756 (or about 1759) he married Elizabeth Foster, and they became the parents of eight children. In 1758 he served as a lieutenant in the French and Indian War. He established himself as a tavern keeper and had a license to operate the Boars Head Tavern, the location of which is not known. However, in 1767 he purchased the property ever since known as the Bonnell Tavern at Clinton in Hunterdon co. He maintained his license there for the rest of his life. His application for the license in 1768 has been preserved as follows:

"To the honourable the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions for the county of Hunterdon now convened at Trenton - - -

"The Petition of the Subscriber Humbly Sheweth - - -

"That your Petitioner has for several Years past been favour'd with a Licence to keep a publick House in the Township of Bethlehem, and having hitherto preserved the good oppinion of his Customers, humbly hopes your Honours will indulge him with a Licence for the ensuing Year and Your Petitioner as in duty bound will ever Pray.

"May 2d, 1768 - - -

/s/ Abrm Bonnel

"We the Subscribers do recommend the above Abraham Bonnell as a person well qualified for keeping a Publick House, and hopes your honours will grant him a Licence for that purpose——"

The signatures of the following subscribers were listed:

James Clifford, Arch. Stewart, Nath. Dunham, Adam Hope, Francis Quick, Danel Donham, David McKinney and Joseph Gordin.

The tavern was the voting place for the northern part of Hunterdon co, and in 1770 it was chosen by the township committeemen as the Bethlehem Township meeting place. Abraham became an active leader in the growing

discontent with British rule, and his Tavern was a center of the resistance movement. It was here in 1775 that the men of the community met to organize the first regiment of Minute Men in New Jersey, after news of the battle of Lexington arrived.

In 1776 Abraham Bonnell, himself, was elected Lieutenant colonel of the Second Regiment of Hunterdon County Militia. He had already participated in the discussions which culminated in the Declaration of Independence. He was a member of the Sons of Liberty and was selected as one of the Hunterdon co delegates at the meeting in Bethlehem twp 11 March 1776. He served with distinction through much of the War and afterwards became a member of the Board of Freeholders and a township committeeman.

Col. Abraham died 1 November 1797 and was succeeded as tavern keeper by his third son Clement DuMont Bonnell. Clement married Rachel Stockton Woolverton in 1787. They lived at and kept the Bonnell Tavern until their deaths within three weeks of each other in early 1836. Like his father, Clement was prominent in the civil life of the community, serving as a judge and freeholder of Bethlehem twp. He was also a member of the Hunterdon co militia.

In his will Clement left the Tavern to his youngest son William C. Bonnell. Although William held the license as tavern owner and has been called "a magistrate of some sort at Clinton," his principal interest was in art. He was a painter of some renown, and some of his portraits are included in the "Catalogue of American Portraits" project of the National Portrait Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution. He is listed in the New York Historical Society's "Directory of Artists in America, 1641-1860." One of his portraits, that of Rev. Holloway Whitfield Hunt, pastor of the Bethlehem Presbyterian Church from 1802 to 1842, is owned today by Clem Bonnell III.

For his tavern William painted a sign depicting a gypsy girl with a tambourine, and the tavern became the Gypsy Girl Tavern for a time. It was William's wife, the former Margaret Hinchman, who ran the tavern, however, while William painted.

William Bonnell died near the end of 1865, and soon after that the Tavern closed, after a century of service to the community. William's son Clement Hinchman Bonnell, the next owner, was the last person to operate the tavern, but the building continued to serve as home to the Bonnell family. Ownership passed from Clement Hinchman Bonnell to his son Clement Milton Bonnell, then to Clement Milton, Jr., then to Clement Milton, III, the present owner. Clement Milton Bonnell, Jr., who grew up in the Tavern, was the last generation of the family actually to live there.

In its heyday the Bonnell Tavern was an important stagecoach stop, since it stood at the point where the "Great Road to the Union" crossed the turnpike from New Brunswick to Easton. Hungry and thirsty travelers refreshed themselves in the well-stocked dining room and bar.

## THE BONNELL TAVERN (Cont'd)

Over the years the house has experienced many additions and modifications. The views you see here present its appearance as a stately private residence, pretty much as it has looked since the period following the Civil War. It is difficult to discern the eighteenth century tavern.

Mrs. Gladys Moss, granddaughter of Clement Hinchman Bonnell, at age 91 reminisced about the house for "Union Township - Rural Recollections":

"The double parlor was a late addition, and the library used to be the bar. We always had Christmas dinner in the old dining room, between the kitchen and the living room, and all the family would gather there. The kitchen had a slate floor and the well was just out behind it. We had a wire cage for melons that we used to lower down in the well to keep the fruit cool. There was an old smoke house out back where we would smoke hams and bacon. The original first bathroom is still there in the house." When the bathroom was added in 1915 it is supposed to have been the first installation of indoor plumbing and steam heat in Clinton.

The house has not been lived in for many years. The front porch had to be removed 10 or 12 years ago because it was in very poor condition. Clem Bonnell, the present owner, hopes to replace it some day. He maintains the building with paint, storm windows, etc., to prevent further deterioration. "Progress" has served the old tavern a blow by placing Interstate Route 78 on fill directly in front of the house. The slope of the fill begins a mere 30 or 40 feet from the front door, and drivers on the highway pass the level of the second story windows.

We can hope that Clem will find a way to restore the Tavern to a renewed usefulness and that it will remain in the Bonnell family for many more generations.

THE BONNELL TAVERN (Cont'd)

The earliest picture we have of the Tavern was probably taken sometime between the 1860's and the 1890's. Wouldn't it be nice who know who the people are on the porch?



This picture was taken by Clem's father, Clement M. Bonnell, Jr., around 1952.

Clem himself took this rear view recently. Note that the porch is gone and I-78 can be seen rising in front of the house, so close that Clem could not photograph it from the front.



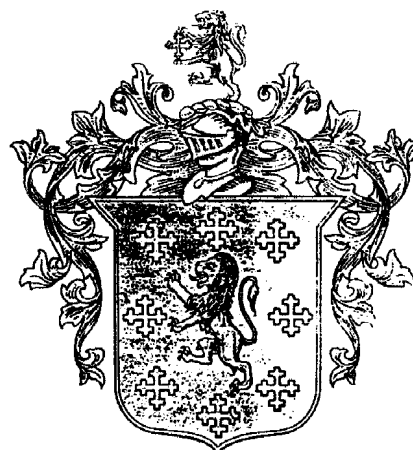
In Volume IV, Number 2, I printed a copy of a Bunnell coat of arms and promised to print one for the Bonnell side of the family when I found a copy good enough to reproduce. There seem to have been several different ones for the Bonnell name, mostly variations on a basic pattern for related branches of the family. While I have never found anyone who could conceivably have had the right to the Bunnell coat of arms, the Bonnell arms probably belonged to various members of the Bonnell family descended from the Huguenot, Thomas Bonnell of Norwich. Certainly, Thomas's grandson Samuel, who was appointed Accountant-General for Ireland at the Restoration of King Charles II, would have borne arms, as would his son James who inherited his office of Accountant-General.

This, I believe is the original Bonnell arms, from which differences were made as needed. I found it in *AMERICANA, ILLUSTRATED*, Vol. XVIII, No. 4, October 1924, published by The American Historical Society.

It is described as follows:

Arms - or, a lion rampant between eight crosses crosslet azure.

Crest - A lion rampant or, holding between the forepaws a cross crosslet azure.

That is, on a gold shield, a blue lion rearing on its hind legs, surrounded by eight blue cross crosslets (equal-armed crosses, with each arm also crossed). The crest is a gold rampant lion holding a blue cross crosslet.

Several of you sent me copies of a Bonnell coat of arms printed by Halberts of Bath, OH. As you can see, while retaining the basic elements it shows differences assigned for a related member of the family. I don't know the specific person to whom either of these belonged.

This is described as follows:

Arms - or, a lion rampant between seven cross crosslets azure, on a chief bendy wavy of six argent and sable a wyvern tail extended vert.

Crest - A demi lion azure holding between the paws a cross crosslet fitchee or.

That is, on a gold shield, a blue rampant lion surrounded by SEVEN blue cross crosslets. The upper third of the shield (the chief) divided into six wavy bands of alternate silver and black, on which is a green dragon-like heraldic animal with its tail extended. The crest shows a partial blue lion. The gold cross crosslet has been modified (fitchee) by elongating the bottom arm into a point without its own cross arm.

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## THOMAS BONNELL, THE HUGUENOT

In the Newsletter and in my correspondence I have been outspoken in an effort to put to rest what I consider to be the spurious claim that William Bunnell was a son of Benjamin Bonnell and a grandson of Thomas Bonnell, the Huguenot of Norwich, England. It occurred to me that it might be wise to set forth what we do know about Thomas Bonnell and his family.

The most extensive investigation of this family, and the primary source for what follows, is contained in a book, a copy of which was sent to me by Mrs. William George, Phoenix, AZ. It is entitled, "THE PERVERSE WIDOW: Being Passages from the Life of CATHARINA, WIFE OF WILLIAM BOEVEY, ESQ., of Flaxley Abbey, in the County of Gloucester. With Genealogical Notes on That Family and Others Connected Therewith.", compiled by Arthur W. Crawley-Boevey, M.A., Bombay Civil Service (Ret.), Barrister-at-law of Lincoln's Inn; Fellow of the Huguenot Society of London. Published by Longmans, Green, and Co., 39 Paternoster Row, London; New York and Bombay. 1898.

Additional information, particularly the baptisms of Thomas's children and grandchildren, comes from the International Genealogical Index.

THOMAS BONNELL, founder of this branch of the Bonnell family in England, and closely connected with the Boevey family, was a gentleman of good family of Hondschoote, near Ypres in Flanders. Hondschoote, in the Chatellenie of Bergues, was one of the first towns in which the reformed religion was introduced; and as early as 1547, proceedings were taken against Guillaume van Damme for having prohibited books in his possession, and writing letters concerning the reformed religion, which terminated with his execution. Hondschoote had in 1566 a population of 28,000 inhabitants, and was an important center of the cloth trade, which caused it to have many business relations with England. Serious disturbances broke out here in 1566, and churches were ravaged and destroyed.

The chief emigration of the Protestants commenced after the defeat of Austruweel 13 March 1567, and considerably increased after the arrival of the Spanish troops, following two principal lines. The Calvinist ministers for the most part took refuge in England, where their churches and consistories had long been regularly organized; the fighting men preferred an asylum in Germany.

On 16 February 1568 a sentence of the Inquisition condemned all the inhabitants of the Netherlands to death as heretics. Only a few persons especially named were excepted. A proclamation of the King dated ten days later confirmed this decree of the Inquisition, and ordered it to be carried into instant execution, without regard to age, sex, or condition. Multitudes of all ranks left the country and settled in England, Holland, and Germany, under these circumstances.

In 1572 another memorable influx of foreigners to England took place on the occasion of the massacre of St. Bartholomew. In 1585, on the sacking of Antwerp, many merchants and citizens came over to England.

It is not known when Thomas Bonnell made the move from Flanders to England. The earliest reference I have found to him in England was in 1581, but he had probably been there for some time.

## THOMAS BONNELL (Cont'd)

When Thomas and his family moved to England they settled in the city of Norwich, in Norfolk, county, where they lived first in the parish of St. John and by 1589 or before in the parish of St. Martin at Palace, both in the Wymer Ward in the city of Norwich. He apparently achieved considerable prominence there. He became an elder in the Walloon church at Norwich on 4 October 1595, and it has been asserted that he later became Mayor of Norwich. This claim does not seem to be supported by any of the public records of the city of Norwich.

The first reference to Thomas Bonnell found in the English records is a tax list of 1581 in which "Thomas Boonnell", an alien, was taxed 16 shillings and 8 pence on goods worth 100 shillings. He was one of the largest taxpayers in several pages of names. In 1597 and again in 1599 he paid a tax of 21s 4d on goods valued at 4£.

We have not found the name of his first wife, whom he apparently married in Flanders. By her he was the father of four sons, Thomas, Daniel, David and Benjamin. Thomas, Jr., and Daniel, and perhaps also David, were born in Flanders. However, the fourth son, Benjamin, was born in Norwich, where he was christened on 7 January 1589.

Thomas's wife died soon after the birth of Benjamin, and he married (second) Jacquemaine (Jacquelyn) Bygote of Norwich. Their children were:

Susan, baptized 15 July 1591, married 22 June 1610 Jan Le Cerf.

John, baptized 19 August 1593.

Elizabeth, born 30 July 1595, baptized 10 August 1595;  
married 11 November 1623 Abraham van Soldt.

Maria, married January 1618 Abraham Verstripen.

Abraham, baptized 15 April 1599.

Isaac, baptized 1 January 1604.

Judye (Judith), baptized 16 March 1605/6; married Lewis de Graf.

Thomas Bonnell died in 1607, and his will was proved in the Consistory Court of Norwich 11 November 1607. In his will he named his present wife Jacquelyn, and referred to children by her without mentioning their names. He named specifically his sons Thomas, Daniel, David, and Benjamin, apparently by a former wife. He also mentioned by name Daniel, Rebecca, Hester and Abigail Bonnell, children of his son Daniel, and Catherine and Susan, daughters of his son David, as well as Judith Marchant, "my grandchild."

Of the sons, Thomas, Jr., was still unmarried in 1607. I have found no further record of him.

Daniel married Rebecca Fenne of Norwich and had nine children between 1600 and 1618: Daniel, Daniel again, Rebecca, Hester, Abigail, Samuel (who became Accountant-General for Ireland), Sara, Anne, and Tobie.

David married (first) Catherine de Beste of London, and (second) Maria van Sornbeke, widow of Andries de Meulmeester. Fourteen children, born between 1605 and 1625, all by the first wife: Catherine, Susanna, David, Jacobus, Anna, Samuel, Esther, Jeremias, Nathaniel, Sarah, Simeon, Maria, Paul and Elizabeth.

THOMAS BONNELL (Cont'd)

Benjamin has been found in four references in the English records. First, his baptism in Norwich on 7 January 1589. Second, on 25 June 1606 Benjamin Bonnel, Bachellor, was given a certificate of membership of membership in the Dutch church in London. Third, in August 1606 the Member Book of the Dutch Church lists Benjamin Bonnel, living with David Bonnel (his brother), with attestation from Norwich. Fourth, Benjamin was mentioned in his father's will probated in Norwich 11 November 1607. At this last appearance in the records he was age 18.

John, Abraham and Isaac, sons of Thomas by his second wife, have been found so far only in the baptismal records in Norwich. Since Thomas did not mention these children by name in his will it is not known whether they were still living when he died.

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Barbara Lee Lewis, Hayward, CA, sent me this clipping from the January-February issue of the PEO Record. Can anyone tell us anything more about Linda Bunnell and where she fits in the family tree?



**For the last two years** *Linda Bunnell, IH, Elkhorn, Nebraska, has served as "Chieftain" of the Scottish Society of Nebraska. She is the first woman to be accorded that distinction. She teaches sixth grade social studies.*

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Mary Katherine DeLong, Belvedere, CA, sent n»e a collection of clippings she obtained from the files of the San Francisco Examiner. Among them was this item from the issue of Sunday, 6 August 1950, under the heading KOREA WAR NEWS, noting that Pfc. Gordon E. Bunnell, of 1131 Fresno Avenue, Berkeley, CA, appeared on the latest Korean casualty list "issued yesterday by the Department of Defense." Bunnel, who was wounded, age 20, "is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred E. Bunnel. The father is a san Francisco insurance man. Young Bunnel graduated from Berkeley High School in 1948 and worked for Southern Pacific in the East Bay until he enlisted in the First cavalry Division fourteen months ago. He has two sisters, Phyllis and Dorothy, living at home."
